Lean opponent, polled a substantial vote.

Senator Steiwer, widely known throughout the state, made a vigorous campaign for re-election. He stressed the value of the lumber import duty to Oregon and in nearly every section of the state he discussed the part he had in obtaining its passage. Gleason, not as widely known as Steiwer, confined himself largely to attacks on the senator's record and on the republican administration.

Returns from 1125 of Oregon's 1783 precincts gave Gleason 51,891 votes, and Steiwer 74,376, a lead of 22,485.

Roosevelt Leads The same number of precincts gave Roosevelt 81,204 and Hoover 56,022.

The race between Butler and Pierce in the second district, comprising counties east of the Cascade mountains, was unusually close, with 224 out of the 440 precincts giving Pierce 12,759 and Butler 10,890.

James W. Mott, republican, state corporation commissioner, and the man who defeated the veteran Republican Willis C. Hawley of the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill in the May nominating election, was assured of election over Harvey Starkweather, his democratic opponent.

POVERTY IN TEMPLE FORCES PRIESTS TO TILL SOIL IN JAPAN

KYOTO, Japan.—(AP)—Hard times, like rain, fall alike upon the just and unjust and Japan's 70,000 Buddhist temples are feeling the pinch of world troubles.

Priests have taken to cultivating temple lands to raise food for themselves and their families.

Temple treasures and rich ecclesiastical robes are appearing in pawnshops and in some of the wretchedly poor rural districts temples are closing.

Elsewhere there is a tendency to amalgamate small temples of slightly different sects.

Fifty thousand of Japan's temples are in the country. With the blight of depression falling more heavily upon farmers than any other class of Japan, many of these small rural farms are poverty stricken.

In good years it is a prosperous temple which receives \$250 a year in voluntary contributions, or as rents or produce from its lands. Out of this the building must be kept in repair.
