A check-up of the poll books in the recent election, revealed a number of Jackson county residents, claiming residence in California or Washington, who voted, and are thereby legal residents of this county and state, and subject to its auto-license laws.

All who voted at the election, and drive foreign licenses, will be subject to prosecution.

Police Awaiting Dry Repeal Rule

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SPECIAL SESSION HELD NECESSARY ADJUST TAXATION

last year, particularly in view of the defeat by voters last week of the increased income tax provision.

A sales tax has been under consideration by the tax commission, budget director and other state leaders since several months. Defeat of the income tax revision has brought the matter to a head, and ground work is now being laid to put such a measure in effect if the old property tax is to be avoided.

Property Tax Lifted. Figuring the revenues from the income, intangibles and excise taxes, coupled with receipts from other sources and the savings effected by the administration would be sufficient to carry on the state government, the tax commission last year lifted the tax on real property to the extent of \$4,500,000.

One Per Cent Needed. Henry Hansen, budget director, said today that a sales tax of only one per cent would be sufficient to take care of the educational provisions as well as provide the deficit for operation of the state government. He

estimated a one per cent tax would bring in \$3,500,000, and would also eliminate from property the one-mill elementary school tax.

The theory of legislative leaders who have been working with the administration is that education is universal and everybody, property owners and others, should contribute towards upkeep. In the past property owners had to bear the entire program. The one per cent sales tax would accomplish the universal payment, it is their expressed view.

An agitation for additional revenue has also come from another source—state relief workers. Raymond Wilcox, head of the Oregon relief work, has pointed out that after the first of the year Oregon would be unable to obtain relief from the federal government unless it shows that every possible method of raising funds had been exhausted.

The first meeting in the new women's club rooms in the city hall will be held Thursday evening of this week, when the Business and Professional Women's club will meet there for regular session. The meeting has been called for 8 o'clock and the program will be in charge of the educational committee of which Miss Elizabeth Burr is chairman.
