LOCAL SHERIFF EXPLAINS POLICY IN TAX ACTION

Relative to the controversy over the filing of unsecured personal tax claims against the Medford News Publishing Co. last Thursday night by the sheriff's officer, Sheriff Jennings said today:

"I filed the tax attachment upon receiving word that furniture had been moved out and that the city water had been shut off. I did this in the course of my official duty to protect the county and myself. The county court did not know officially of this action until late Monday, as this is the usual procedure in cases of this nature.

"Unsecured personal tax claims are preferred. The entire matter is involved by other claims and does not embody real property taxes unpaid.

"This case is not the only one where action has been instituted for the collection of unsecured personal tax claims, and an effort will be made to collect all such taxes between now and January 1. The regular routine will be followed."
