

STAY OF LAUDER MADE PLEASANT BY FRIENDS HERE

Sir Harry Lauder, whose contagious laugh, spirited folk song and lively dance brought from the audience at the Craterian theater last night the greatest applause accorded an artist appearing in this city in many years, left this morning for Klamath Falls with his niece, Miss Greta Lauder, and their troupe of talented entertainers.

Leaving in the city his famous contribution to the world, the desire to laugh, to live and to "sing away your troubles," he and his "wee bonnies" stay here will be remembered by all who heard him for a long, long time.

The sincerity and simplicity which dominated his program last night, arousing in all present cause to laugh "with him," more than "at him," was also felt in all his private interviews with local folk, who entertained the famous Scotchman yesterday.

In the afternoon he motored to Big Rock lodge, river home of Wm. F. Isaacs. In the party were Sir Harry's niece, Miss Greta Lauder, James E. Cooke of Seattle, who met them on the train coming into Medford Sunday, and Mr. Isaacs and son, Dick.

The grounds of the lodge were visited and the beauty of the Rogue and all the scenery between here and there, won the enthusiastic praise of the guests, who were especially fond of the Table Rocks, describing them as "just like the Table mountains of Scotland."

The ducks and turkeys which inhabit the grounds at Big Rock lodge were also much enjoyed by Sir Harry and his niece, who entertained their hosts with stories of Scotland and the home, which is being built for them now, just 17 miles from Glasgow. Departing from the turkey pens, Sir Harry gathered up a "bouquet of turkey feathers" and brought them with him into the city.

The Rogue River Valley golf course was also visited by Sir Harry and several of the valley's most prominent country homes.

In the evening with his niece, he was guest of Rev. and Mrs. W. J. Howell, with whom the Lauders have been closely associated for many years. Mrs. Howell's sister being one of the Royal nurses in London, and the one who cared for Sir Harry's son, who was killed in the World war.

Their last visit with the famous comedian, preceding their meeting yesterday, was seven years ago in Aberdeen, Wash. At that time he was accompanied by his wife and her brother, Tom, who traveled with them for many years. About five years ago death took Mrs. Lauder from the company, and last August while Sir Harry was singing, as only he can sing, "She's a Daisy," Tom dropped dead back stage.

ASHLAND WOMAN DIES ON STREET

Mrs. Anna A. Hudgins, 70, of Ashland, where she sold flowers on the streets in the summer and was known to scores, dropped dead on a street of that city last evening. Death was attributed to heart failure. She lived alone in humble quarters.

The aged woman was walking past the home of T. W. Hill on Chambers street when stricken. Hill, watching from the window, saw her topple to the sidewalk. Hill rushed to her side, but life was extinct. Deputy Coroner H. C. Stock was summoned, and took charge.

State police this morning were rekey, thought to be a resident of Portland. A sister, name unknown, is thought to be living in Flint, Mich.

The state police searched the two-room abode of the unfortunate woman. It was filled with furniture, and a large number of old newspapers.

Mrs. Hudgins was a resident of Ashland for several years. Little is known of her past or former circumstances.

WHITNEY AWARDED WAGE IN DECISION

A circuit court jury about midnight last night returned a verdict awarding \$209.90 to Harry L. Whitney in his suit against Walter W. Johnson for money alleged due for labor and services in 1930 and 1931, in connection with prospecting operations on Elliott creek, near the California line in the upper Apple-gate region. Whitney sought \$377.50.

The civil action of Mrs. Ella Phillips of Eagle Point district against Fred Honner and the Crown Mills for \$300 for alleged imperfect feed, causing the death of turkeys, was started in circuit court this morning. Selection of a jury was under way this morning.

PORTLAND BUTTER JUMPS 4-5 CTS.

PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Apparent manipulative trend forced the price of cube butter on the Portland Produce Exchange 4 to 5c higher for the week's initial session. It was not only a sensational advance which was the greatest individual boost ever given values in Portland at one time, but sent the market here to the highest figure in the entire country.

The market appeared manipulative from the start and indicated the influence of holders of storage goods who are trying to force greater profits in their direction.

Insofar as supply and demand was concerned, there appeared no call for any such movement of values.

The advance of 4-5c in the price of butterfat here, put the buying values not only to the highest of the season here to date, but to the highest mark in the coast territory.

TURKEY PRICES CONTINUE DOWN

PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The turkey market was erratic today, prices appearing to reflect but little change from the previous day. Best turkey sold around 18 to 17c a pound for hens and toms, although the latter were mostly at the low mark. Demand continued best for hens and small toms which were not really plentiful.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Turkey prices dropped today to a basis of 15-16c a pound wholesale, and were offered by some retailers as low as 10c. Prices were down 3 to 6c a pound.

George Makina, manager of the California Turkey Growers association, said in all his 25 years' experience in turkey markets he had never seen such low prices.
