

5 MILLION SEALS OREGON QUOTA IN ANTI-T. B. FIGHT

Five million Christmas seals are to be sold in Oregon, beginning the day after Thanksgiving, and continuing through Christmas day.

In conformity with the contracts of the American Red Cross with the National Tuberculosis association, public sale of the Christmas seals does not take place before Thanksgiving day. Likewise, Red Cross campaign activities cease on Thanksgiving day.

Mrs. R. E. Green, chairman for the seal sale in Jackson county, has her work well organized, and with Miss Mildred Carlton, county chairman of the public health work, and the various district chairmen, hopes to put Jackson county "over the top" on that clinic, nursing service, pre-natal and post-natal care, as well as combating of the inroads of tuberculosis may continue with best effect in every city, hamlet or outlying portion of the county.

The churches of the county are asked to observe next Sunday as Tuberculosis Sunday. Schools, service clubs, women's organizations, and lodges are asked to co-operate by announcing the date and purpose of the seal campaign.

Posters, radio talks, theater slides and other agencies will be utilized as well as newspaper stories in the endeavor to bring to the public the real need for their support of this welfare activity.

More than a thousand volunteer workers will give their services all over the state, feeling that tuberculosis, which causes more deaths of children under 15 than any other communicable disease, and which is still the third cause of death among the industrial population and the leading cause of death in persons dying between the ages of 15 and 40 years, presents a health problem of grave concern to the public.

The work of the local health unit, largely financed by proceeds from the annual seal sale, has done much important service in the matter of disease control and in checking the advance of tuberculosis by such methods as child clinics, tubercular testing, and prompt measures to avoid development of disease.

COAST BASEBALL MOGULS SETTLE GAME SCHEDULE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—(P)—Pacific Coast league baseball faced the 1933 season today with the schedule for the first four weeks adopted as official and regulations almost unchanged, as a result of the shortest annual directors' meeting in the league's 29 years.

The directors, who concluded their season in two hours yesterday, agreed to cut the player waiver price from \$3,000 to \$1,250, effective December 15. With this and adoption of the four-week playing schedule, starting April 4, directors adjourned, apparently undisturbed by several problems which had been expected to cause trouble.

The admission prices to games, it was agreed, will remain the same as last season.

On the question of limits on salaries and player personnel, the directors voted they would steer clear of any agreement with other class AA leagues. The present league player limit is 25.

Night baseball and radio broadcasting of games were left in the hands of the individual clubs.

It was announced the 1933 season will run for 26 weeks, ending October 1, and will not be split.

NEWS RECEIVER AWAITS COMING OF JUDGE BRAND

Circuit Judge James T. Brand of Coos county, assigned by the state supreme court to hear the petition of H. T. Hubbard and three other former employees, for a receiver for the Medford News Publishing Co., when an affidavit of prejudice was filed against Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, by L. A. Banks, publisher, through his attorney, M. O. Wilkins of Ashland, will in all probability not hear the case until the first of next week.

Judge Brand was previously scheduled to preside over the Jackson county court for a week, beginning next Monday, in the four News libel cases, in which affidavits of prejudice were also filed against Judge Norton by L. A. Banks and F. A. Bates of Footh Creek, through Attorney M. O. Wilkins. Due to pressure of judicial matters in his own district, and the Thanksgiving holiday intervening, Judge Brand delayed coming here.

Next week Circuit Judge Norton will occupy the Klamath county bench, hearing cases in which Judge W. M. Duncan is disqualified.
