RED CROSS FUND FAR BEHIND QUOTA LUNCHEON IS TOLD

L. B. Humphrys represented the Red Cross today at the luncheon of the Allied Welfare association at the Hotel Medford, and reported that Jackson county is still far short of her quota in the annual roll-call drive. The total reported by Mr. Humphrys was \$3064.95. This amount does not include returns from several Granges and other organizations about the county. The quota for this year is \$9000. The Kiwanis club will canvass the city to redneck the cards from which donations have not yet been received.

Report on the county relief work was given today by Mrs. A. E. Reames, who showed that there are 34 widowed indigents in the county, receiving \$10 a month, and over 70 regular indigents with children. One hundred people have been sent out on county road work and 150 requisitions were filed during the past 12 days. She also reported 1700 dependents in the county and 3500 workers registered during the fruit currency and payment in native currency and volunteer leaders. The Parent-Teacher organization reported that 25 children are being served hot lunches.

Mrs. Margaret Kerr of the Y. W. C. A. reported helpful classes being conducted to supply amusement for working girls. Report on the Lions' community relief kitchen was made by Officer George J. Prescott, who announced that 289 people were fed the first week and that tickets to be exchanged for labor are being sold all persons who wish to give meal tickets to the hungry in preference to money.

Mrs. Sydney Richardson spoke to the association, condemning motion pictures which show cruelty to animals.

It was announced that the Active club is sponsoring the Boy Scout troop at Berrydale and has donated \$5 a month toward the community health house there.

FRANCE ADVISED NO FURTHER DELAY DEBT PAYMENTS

(Continued from Page One) 15 payments, likely will move to pay those installments in their own currency.

Generally, congressional leaders who oppose a new moratorium or creation of an agency to re-examine the debt question were inclined to favor the proposal in native currency and payment in native currency probably will support the proposal in congress if any debtor applies.

Foreign exchange is a complicated affair, but the payments really become simple matters of transfer of credits when all is said and done. No gold or goods cross the ocean. At present the former is scarce and there is just too much of the latter.

This is the way it would work under Mr. Hoover's plan: England, for instance owes \$95,000,000 as her December payment. As normal par, 20,000,000 English pounds will buy \$95,000,000 in dollar credits. And so England would deposit 20,000,000 pounds, guaranteeing that when those pounds are cashed into dollars, they would equal \$95,000,000.

But the present exchange rate, with a surplus of pound credits and a scarcity of dollar credits, would require 30,000,000 pounds to get the same \$95,000,000.

Therefore, the American plan would allow England to deposit her 20,000,000 pounds and convert them into dollars as favorable as exchange rates permit, always with the guarantee that America would get \$95,000,000 regardless of how many pounds it took.

In this way foreign nations would have time in which to obtain dollars deposited in American banks at favorable rates of exchange, instead of having to take whatever the prevailing rate was on the day payment was due.
