

PLACE KICK WINS CONFERENCE TITLE FOR TROJANS, 9-6

Huskies Hold Mighty Squad on Soggy Gridiron—Break in Final Quarter Gives Victory to Howard Jones

By Frank G. Gerrie, (Associated Press Sports Writer.) SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—(AP)—The Trojans of Southern California were sitting on the throne of Pacific coast football today and were there to stay at least until another season rolls around.

Two mighty boots of a pigskin yesterday—one in Seattle and the other way down in Los Angeles—combined to give U. S. C. its second successive Pacific Coast conference title.

A field goal from the accurate toe of Cal Clemens was the margin by which Southern California edged out the University of Washington, 9 to 6 on a soggy gridiron in the Washington stadium here and sent the Trojans scaling closer to the top of the national championship mast.

Approximately one hour after the Seattle "turkey day" battle, U. S. C. was awarded undisputed possession of the coast crown when John Burk of Washington State college booted the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins out of the championship picture in the California city. He kicked a field goal from the 40-yard line in the last second of play to give the Cougars a 3 to 0 victory and puncture the undefeated conference record of the Uclas.

Favored to conquer by from two to four touchdowns, Southern California was thankful to win from the Huskies by the narrow margin of three points after they discovered that Washington had something besides a stadium, pretty suits and a football.

The Trojans drove with relentless power at the Husky goal line but only twice were they able to tally. Failing to reach their objective in the first half they called upon Clemens to break the ice with a field goal and the youngster split the uprights with a placekick from Washington's 19-yard line in the second period.

Southern California hung on to this slender lead through the third period and then proceeded to score a touchdown in the final quarter when it gained a break on a bad Husky punt.

The men of Troy started a drive on the Washington 37-yard line that saw "Cotton" Warburton, sensational little quarterback, smash over the northerners' goal line on a final down.

Washington continued its stubborn battle and it was rewarded a few minutes later with a touchdown, the second scored against the Trojans in their eight games this season.

The Huskies recovered a fumble on U. S. C.'s 48-yard line and a pass, Ahonen to Smith, netted 20 yards. Another pass that fell dead but allowed by the officials because of interference, put the ball on the 8-yard line and the 30,000 fans were brought to their feet when Ahonen raced toward the sidelines and flipped a pass to Dave Nabet, and the Husky end hauled it down while standing on the goal line.

The attempt at extra point by both Southern California and Washington went wild.

The Huskies will now prepare for their last game with U. C. L. A. at Los Angeles December 3, and Southern California will polish up for their final scheduled game with Notre Dame at Los Angeles December 10.

BROVELLI'S DRIVE IN FINAL PERIOD DEFEATS OREGON

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—(AP)—In a final-period 80-yard drive, the St. Mary's Gaels, led by a forgiven "bad boy" fullback, turned back a fighting University of Oregon football team to win a 7 to 6 battle before 20,000 spectators in Kezar stadium here yesterday.

The fullback, Angel Brovelli, who was under a cloud for breaking training rules, was rushed into the game in the third period to aid a sorely pressed St. Mary's team.

Brovelli swung into action immediately and his example appeared to put new life in the Gaels. He was the individual star of the 80-yard thrust to victory, carrying the ball 10 times for a total gain of 52 yards. Charley Baird, left halfback, contributed to the yardage with runs and also heaved the climaxing pass for the touchdown.

The pass, tossed on a fourth down with the Gaels two yards from the Oregon goal line, crossed up to the northerners, who were looking for a line plunge. George Cantrius, end, caught the pass behind the goal line. Carl Jorgensen converted with a place kick.

Until Brovelli went into the game, the green-shirted invaders pushed the Gaels down the field repeatedly and twice came within threatening distance. In the third period, an Oregon 43-yard drive, led by Mikulak, thundering fullback, and Temple, feet-footed half, was checked on the Gaels' 17-yard line as Kostka's pass dropped incomplete in the end zone.

Again, early in the fourth quarter, the Webfeet, unchecked even by Brovelli's presence in the battle, repeated the drive, and Ted Geisecke, substitute guard, was sent in to attempt a place kick. His kick went wide.

A perpetual trophy, offered as the symbol of victory for the annual Thanksgiving game between the two teams, was presented by Governors Julius L. Meier of Oregon and James Rolph, Jr., of California. The presentation was made by the two governors from the field just before the start of the game.

SALEM, TILLAMOOK ALBANY VICTORS

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Astoria high school fell before the determined attack of Tillamook's football team here yesterday as Tillamook ran up from behind to grab a 19 to 14 victory, for their seventh consecutive win.

STATERS TOPPLED BY DETROIT, 14-6, IN HECTIC BATTLE

DETROIT, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Oregon State's touring football team was en route home today after falling before the University of Detroit, 14 to 6, in a Thanksgiving game witnessed by 10,000 spectators.

Coch Charles Dorais started his second string team in the first period and the Staters hammered their way to the six-yard line and smashed over a touchdown. Dorais then rushed in his first stringers, after which the Detroiters held the advantage. The second period, filled with soaring forward passes, gave the Titans two touchdowns. Although the Staters' squad outweighed the Detroit line, it could not budge the home team when there was any chance of a gain toward goal.

K. Davis, Oregon State's great punter and passer, furnished the crowd some wild moments as he tried to meet the Detroit passing attack with an aerial offense of his own. Once he missed a pass from center, recovered the ball on his own 10-yard line and with the whole Titan line bearing down on him, hurled a pass that traveled more than 45 yards to Moe, State's right half, in center field. Both Detroit's touchdowns were made on passes. For the second score, Nott hurled a spectacular 45-yard pass to Young, who dived over the goal line to catch the ball.

The Staters, who took along textbooks and an instructor, resumed their studies as they resumed their homeward journey.

ARMY BOOSTED FOR ROSE BOWL GAME

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Army's Cadets entered the Rose tournament football picture today with the University of Southern California almost certain to defend the far west honors on the annual classic at Pasadena, January 2, as the 1932 Pacific Coast conference champions.

Unofficially, certain members of the Trojan athletic board of control have said they would like to have the team from West Point as an opponent should Army defeat Notre Dame Saturday.

Whether the Cadet officials have been asked for their reactions if they should be invited to represent the east, despite their defeat by Pittsburgh, could not be ascertained, since such matters are held in strict confidence by Rose tournament officials.
