

EUBANKS' 40-YARD KICK GIVES W. S. C. WIN OVER UCLANS

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 25.—(AP)—John Eubank can continue to stoke Coach Orin (Babe) Hollingsbery's furnace the winter out for his board and keep while he attends Washington State college.

The former Glendale, Calif., full-back and 187-pound sophomore kicked one of the longest field goals of the season at the Olympic stadium with one second to play yesterday to give the Cougar football team a 3 to 0 victory over the University of California at Los Angeles.

That place kick, which went 50 yards, boosted the Bruins right out of the Pacific Coast leadership they had held because it was their first conference defeat, although the second of the season.

Eubank was an all-southern California conference full-back at Glendale, J. C. for two years until he decided to go north to seek further grid garlands at Washington State college. The lad lacked sufficient finances so Coach Hollingsbery gave him a job keeping the furnace roaring through the long northern winter, and a bed in the basement.

He played only a few minutes against Coach Bill Spaulding's team yesterday, but ran true to form by keeping the Uclans in hot water with first a place kick from the eight yard line which was a bit wide, and then the one which sailed through the uprights from the 40-yard line just after the final gun sounded.

The two teams played to a standstill for 55 minutes of the game. U. C. L. A. was on the Cougar 24 yard line as the half-time gun barked, and had two other scoring chances which went for naught.

Statistically, Washington State held the edge, nine first downs to four and 184 yards to 107. The Cougars completed five of fifteen passes against 3 of eleven for the Uclans. Kicking honors were almost even.

DEMOCRAT CHIEFS IN SCRAMBLE FOR HOUSE LEADERSHIP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Organization of the Democratic house in the new congress from the selection of a successor to Speaker Garner down to the last committee post, already is troubling holdover members in view of their large majority.

Activity in the drive for speaker-ship nomination—tantamount to election—is reaching a feverish pitch. A deluge of letters has gone to the 313 Democratic member-elect in behalf of announced and unannounced candidates.

Representative Rainey of Illinois, floor leader, and Representative Rankin of Mississippi, chairman of the veterans' committee, are now in the field, but formal announcement in behalf of Representative McDuffie of Alabama, the party whip, soon is expected by his friends.

Byrns of Tennessee, chairman of the appropriations committee; Bankhead of Alabama, Warren of North Carolina, O'Connor of New York, and Greenwood of Alabama, also have urged to enter the race.

Selection of a party leader comes next in the Democratic caucus, which probably will be held after March 4. If the speakership goes to the mid-west, the leadership probably will go to the southeast. But if the southeast wins the speakership, the leadership undoubtedly will go north of Dixie.

Because of the large incoming Democratic membership, talk of creating a steering committee such as the Republicans have had to decide party legislation is heard. The Democrats have shaped their plans in party caucus.

At present on all major committees of 21 members, the Democrats hold twelve and the Republicans nine seats. But in the new house, the Democrats plan to take at least 15 and probably more committee seats and the votes of holdover members in the short session important legislation will be a factor in picking the high commands and chairmanships in the new congress.

HASTY ATTITUDE ON WAR DEBT DESCRIBED

BIRMINGHAM, England, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, today advised England to avoid adopting "any hasty attitude" on the answer of the United States to Britain's plea for reconsideration of the debt question.

"I am very glad to see that President Hoover recognizes that our request for a frank discussion on the difficult debt subject is a reasonable one and that he is apparently not adverse to some means whereby it may once more be the subject of conversations," Mr. Chamberlain said.

"I think we should do well for the present to abstain from any hasty attitude as to the final attitude of the American congress either upon the question of suspension of the mid-December payments or upon the larger question of the debt itself."

BILL PROPOSED TO BAN PENSIONS FOR UNHURT SOLDIERS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 25.—(AP)—A constitutional amendment prohibiting payment of bonuses and pensions to soldiers uninjured in war is proposed by Samuel Harden Church, president of Carnegie Institute, in the November issue of the Carnegie magazine.

Church recites that Gibbon, the historian, attributed the fall of the Roman empire to the mercenary demands of her soldiers and says "we are rapidly advancing to that point in this country."

Church's article, in the form of a letter to President Hoover, says: "My purpose in offering this amendment is to put an end to the raids upon the treasury which follow every war, and which, through the connivance of fearful politicians, transforms our armies of patriotic citizens into regiments of mercenary troops and soldiers of fortune."

Church says a great majority of the soldiers in the world war "resent this debasement of patriotism as the negation of all that is noble and exalted in the ideals of the nation."

AL SMITH TOUTED TO RULE FILIPINOS

MANILA, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith, former New York governor and 1928 Democratic candidate for President of the United States, would be a "most excellent" selection for governor-general of the Philippines, President Manuel L. Quezon of the Philippine senate said today in commenting on a rumor that Smith might receive that appointment.


"I have expressed no opinion so far as to who should be governor-general under the Democratic administration leader said. "But if Governor Roosevelt is to leave the Philippines"—Governor-General Theodore Roosevelt, son of the former President Roosevelt—"I would consider the appointment of Smith most excellent."

President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt is a distant cousin of the present governor-general, who is a Republican. Quezon cooperated closely with Governor-General Roosevelt during the recent legislative session, and it had been reported he might go to the United States soon and urge that Roosevelt be retained.
