HAYES' INJURIES IN AUTO MISHAP FEARED SERIOUS

James Hayes, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. James C. Hayes, who received serious injuries in an auto accident at Oakland, when returning to the University of Oregon Sunday night, was said to be suffering today from possible internal injuries. Not apparent yesterday. Symptoms of intra-abdominal injuries were reported by his father this morning, following a consultation at the Sacred Heart hospital, where the boy is receiving treatment.

Hayes was returned to Medford yesterday morning on the south bound train and taken to the Sacred Heart hospital, where the doctor reported this morning a thorough examination was prevented by his condition.

He was found, however, to be suffering from back, shoulder and chest injuries and to have several broken ribs, yesterday. His sister, Mary Hayes, and Bill Cunningham were driving to Eugene with the injured youth when the accident occurred, but they were not seriously injured. James, who was driving, was pinned under the car, which turned over three times, after leaving the highway, when the driver was blinded by approaching lights.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)—Theodore Jordan, a negro, was indicted by the county grand jury here Monday for first degree murder in connection with the death of F. E.
