

WOCKER TO FACE ILLINOIS KIDNAP CHARGE, IS WORD

Warren Wockner, 25, arrested Saturday night, and wanted in four states for alleged felonies, will probably be returned to Illinois, according to the district attorney's office. Wockner is wanted in Waukegan, Ill., for kidnaping and holding prisoner a banker, in an effort to force him to open the bank vaults. The plan failed because the time-limits were set for 48 hours instead of 36 hours, as customary. California also seeks his return.

Telegrams received from Illinois yesterday by state police said that steps for issuance of extradition papers were underway and that an officer would be dispatched at once for the prisoner.

According to the state police, Wockner talks freely, and told them that his two companions in the Waukegan, Ill., affair are now serving prison sentences.

Wockner is wanted in Florida for robbery, auto theft and a pistol duel with Jacksonville, Fla., officers, in California for robbery in Humboldt and Santa Cruz counties, and in Washington for auto theft.

Wockner has been living in a trapper's cabin, six miles from Trail, and was arrested in a surprise. The trail over the Umpqua divide into Douglas county was under guard Saturday, to prevent any escape. Wockner has relatives living in the Trail district and at Gold Beach, Curry county. He has been in this section since last summer.

Wockner made two sensational escapes. At Jacksonville, Fla., wounded in the leg and in a hospital, he picked his fingers with a razor blade, and fled. He escaped from the Santa Cruz, Cal., hospital, where he was under surveillance, when he learned his fingerprints were to be taken.

Smith will be sole representative of the concern, according to the announcement today. Already a number of artistic signs are under construction by the newly formed Medford Neon sign company.

One of the outstanding sign jobs completed during the past year by H. S. Cleveland, head of the new company, was a series of artistic road signs which were personally executed by Mr. Cleveland under the sponsorship of the Medford Rotary club.

He told officers that he had taken bicycles on two previous occasions. The Hanscoms reside about eight miles from Medford, and the youth comes to school by bus.

FOREIGN BUTTER FEEDS SOLDIERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—(AP)—A real fight to force the United States government to purchase American made butter for its armies and navy, is being started in Oregon and is expected to be carried to the floor of the annual convention of the American Creamery Butter Manufacturers' association. The trade claims that there is not the slightest excuse for the government to purchase New Zealand butter instead of the American product and pressure will be brought to bear to have the system changed.

The fact that New Zealand and mid-west butter are being offered to the Pacific slope trade at prices 4 to 5c below the established values here, indicate that the previous advance along the coast was somewhat out of line with actual supply and demand.

If this foreign butter comes to the coast, and there appears some assurance that it will, it means a curtailed call for the home product.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS PLANNING SPECIAL BALLOT ON LEVIES

Thirty-two of the 101 school districts of Jackson county have filed notice with the county clerk of elections for the passing of special school levies for 1933. The special levy elections, under the law, must be held before December 1, but extensions of time are permissible.

Amounts sought in the special levies range from \$69.64 in the Wagner Creek district, to \$10,036 sought in Jacksonville district. The Howard district, located on the north Pacific highway, between this city and Central Point, is next to the highest, with a special levy of \$7,385.

The Evans Valley district, in the north end of the county, sponsors a special levy of \$5,914.46—one of the largest in the records of the district. School districts of the county seeking special levies of \$1,000 or more are:

Bellview, \$3,530.50; Crater Lake, \$2,000; Dead Indian, \$2,145.70; Prospect, \$1,349.32; Reese Creek, \$1,178.56; Roguelands, \$1,660; Griffin Creek, \$2,151; Willow Springs, \$1,211.30; Valley View, \$1,377.19.

School districts seeking below \$1,000 are: Long Mountain, \$496.49; Siskiyou, \$855.95; Forrest Creek, \$33; Lost Creek, \$232.32; Wagner Creek, \$39.94; Little Butte Creek, \$587.13; Anderson Creek, \$465.40; Hatchery, \$935; Fern Valley, \$600; Neil Creek, \$638; Antelope, \$713; Lost Creek, \$635; Missouri Plat, \$233; Sterling, \$384.89; Thompson Creek, \$507.17; Meadows, \$240.

Jacksonville is the only incorporated town to file a special levy notice; the remainder are all rural districts. The special levies are for improvements and general expenses and salaries.

TOLLEFSON PLEA ARGUED IN COURT

Arguments are being heard today before the supreme court at Salem on the appeal of I. Alvin Tollefson, former cashier of the Central Point State bank, under two years sentence in state prison, for perpetration of a bank robbery hoax last May.

Constitutional points of law are the main issues involved. The defense is represented by Attorney A. E. Heames of this city, the state by District Attorney George A. Coddington. Tollefson admitted the hoax to cover gambling losses. The money appropriated was afterwards recovered, and the bank lost nothing. Tollefson entered a plea of guilty. Before sentence was passed by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, petitions signed by a majority of the depositors in the bank, were presented asking leniency. Since then Tollefson has been at liberty on bonds.

The defense holds that Tollefson was not accorded his full constitutional rights, and that the legality of his sentence is in question. It is understood that in the event of a reversal in the state supreme court, the case will be carried to the United States supreme court.
