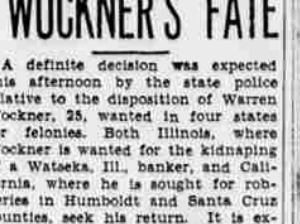

In connection with the showing of "The Speed Demon," a story of outboard motor racing, at the Rialto theatre Thursday and Friday, the theatre has on display the boat with which Harold Gray has made a clean sweep of many races in which he has entered throughout the state.

"Irish Luck," as he calls the little speedster, has carried Gray and Joe Meyer to victory in races at Klamath Falls, Astoria, Gold Beach, Savage Rapids and many other speed tests. With the powerful Johnson "Sea Horse" racing motor, which is also being shown with the boat, "Irish Luck" is capable of doing better than fifty miles an hour, giving a good idea of the tremendous speed and efficiency of the little boats which provide the exciting background for the picture, "The Speed Demon."

The fastest inboard motor boat, such as driven by Kaye Don or Gar Wood, with a 6000 horsepower engine—120 times as powerful as that of the smaller craft—has reached the speed of only 120 miles an hour, or a little more than twice the speed.

"The Speed Demon," the first film to bring the thrills of outboard racing to the screen, has a cast that includes William Collier, Jr., Joan Marsh, Robert Ellis, Wheeler Oakman and many others.

POWERS TO TALK DAVIS' PROPOSAL ON DISARMAMENT

PARIS, Nov. 30.—(AP)—An agreement for reduction of armaments on principles formulated by Norman Davis, the American representative, is the main object of a five-power conference to be held at Geneva at the end of this week, it was learned today.

If the parley is successful it will mean virtually that the great powers will engage to bring about curtailment not only of war materials but also of main power.

Mr. Davis has been driving quietly toward this tangible goal in his conversations with the German, Italian and British representatives at Geneva and with Premier Herriot here.

Apparently he decided that the only way to get quick results is to remove from disarmament discussions such dangerous political matters as that of security against aggression and that of equality in armaments.

The indications are that he has succeeded in negotiating a sort of truce in the discussion of these matters.
