HI JOHNSON CALLS UPON REPUBLICANS FOR A 'NEW DEAL'

Last Election Held Omnious Warning, Says California Bolter - Refuses to 'Deal' On Congress Organization

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. (AP) - Senator Johnson of California, who bolted the Republican national ticket to support Governor Roosevelt, called upon the Republicans today, upon his return to the capital, to declare a "new deal." "Unless there is a new deal in the Republican party," asserted the Californian, "the last election has its ominous warning." "It is all popping to talk of reading someone out of the party. It is the other way around. In California Governor Roosevelt's polled as many Republican votes as Mr. Hoover. Refuses to Deal. "If some of the gentlemen on the other side don't stop their clamoring we will read them out of the Republican party." Johnson said he would be glad to confer with Democratic leaders on the legislative program for the forthcoming congress, but he emphasized he would take no part in any deal on organization. "I have not been invited by the Democrats to keep my chairmanship of the commerce committee in the new congress," he said, "but if I were I would make it clear that I would leave this post to the Democratic party." Doubts Quick Repeal. Declaring for repeal of the eighteenth amendment and for legalization of beer and wine, Johnson expressed doubt whether these steps could be accomplished in the short session. He declared unemployment "the great pressing problem" and demanded federal aid to meet it. He favored a special session of the new congress early this spring would be unavoidable. Opposes Debt Tinkering. As a leader of the contest against the moratorium on war debts a year ago, Johnson reaffirmed emphatic opposition to any "tinkering" at this time with the debts. "There is just one thing to the whole debt problem," he said. "That is whether the European nations shall pay our government what they owe us or shall the American taxpayers pay what the European nations owe us?" "It is utter nonsense to say that France and Italy can't pay. It might strain Great Britain some, but that is no reason why we should put this burden on the backs of the taxpayers."

REINDEER FATHER DIES IN OAKLAND

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 30. (Sp.) - Few persons who heard of the funeral here yesterday of Karl Magnus Klejberg, 56, knew he was once acclaimed by Equinimos and sordid miners as "the father of the Alaskan reindeer industry." In 1895, while Klejberg was living in his native Norway, word reached there that residents of Alaska were starving. A plan was formed to stock the Alaskan country with reindeer, which then were numerous in Norway, and Klejberg was selected to lead an expedition. He crossed the Atlantic with a shipload of the animals, took them overland by train and drove them over the dangerous trail through Chilcoot pass into Alaska.
