

### CARE OF DISABLED BRINGS MILLIONS TO OREGON PURSE

"Hundreds of thousands of dollars that now are coming annually into Oregon will be withheld from the channels of business, and instead, the burden of higher local and state taxes will occur if organized groups succeed in stopping various benefits now existing under law for disabled veterans," says L. C. Garlock, Medford Legion post commander, who quotes a statement by Louis A. Johnson, national commander of the American Legion.

In the statements just issued, the national commander said, in part, as follows:

"The chamber of commerce of the United States, through its (legitimate or illegitimate?) stepdaughter, 'Nel,' as the American Legion has come to know the National Economy League, is seeking, through misrepresentation to unduly alarm the country regarding the cost of caring for disabled veterans. Admiral Byrd is the spear-head for 'Nel' in touring the country. He is the distinguished son of a distinguished family and while I have naught to say against him personally, I believe that unwittingly and unintentionally he is the stalking horse for that comparatively small group whose profits in one year (1928) were \$6,309,000,000.

"The opposition of this group to the care of the disabled has been traced to the fact that out of their huge profits they pay a large share of the federal income tax, and if the care of the disabled is curtailed their taxes can be reduced because the burden can then be shifted to the 'little fellow' or local tax payer, few of whom pay or know very much about any federal income tax. In the year of our greatest prosperity, 1928, this group of opponents paid a total federal income tax of \$908,000,000, leaving them an average net income of \$129,000 each out of their more than six billion dollars' profits.

"If their scheme should succeed, it is easy enough to understand that Oregon would immediately have several thousand disabled veterans thrown upon the mercy of the local communities. Many of these disabled men would have no means of support, and instead of spending federal payments for groceries, medicine, clothing, etc., would be objects of charity. "Therefore, the channels of traffic in the communities of Oregon would lose that income now coming to them and in addition, the local taxes for the upkeep of local hospitals county farms and other institutions would increase. This does not take into consideration the human misery involved, nor the fact that it is cheaper in the end to cure these men and to restore them to self-support. How much wiser to 'cure' rather than 'curese.'"

### GASOLINE SALES IN OREGON BACK TO 1927 LEVEL

SALEM, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Gasoline consumption in Oregon during the month of October slipped back to a level of five years ago and distillate sales for the same month were the lowest in 12 years, a statistical report on motor vehicle fuel taxes, released today by Hal E. Moss, secretary of state, showed. The total tax collected, as shown on the tabulation, is a low mark since 1929.

Wholesale fuel distributors reported the sale of 13,262,293 gallons of gasoline and 137,798 gallons of distillate in October of this year. By virtue of its four-cent tax on gasoline and three and one-half cent tax on distillate, the state collected \$535,314.34 in fuel taxes.

Probably the largest factor in the heavy shrinkage of fuel consumption is the decreased use of motorized farm equipment, Moss said. "Further evidence of decreased fuel consumption by agricultural enterprises is shown by the gasoline tax refunds which were \$4887.47 less last month than those of the previous month," the secretary pointed out. Refunds allowed during November, based on October fuel consumption, were \$67,587.23 while \$72,474.70 tax refunds were allowed by the department in September fuel sales.

### Sailors Slain By Chinese Bandits

HANKOW, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Wireless dispatches from the American Yangtze rapid steamship company's steamer Iping today reported the killing of several members of her crew, all Chinese, by bandits' shell-fire. The dispatches said the bandits were deployed along the Yangtze's shores 55 miles below Ichang, a city of 55,000 due west of here in Hupeh province.

### No Fatalities In Oregon Industry

SALEM, Dec. 2.—(AP)—No fatalities have resulted from industrial accidents the past two weeks, the state commission reported today. The number of accidents the past week totalled 406, or twenty more than the week previous.

### Coast Highway Is Blocked By Slide

SALEM, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Oregon coast highway north of Bar View, in Tillamook county, was blocked by a slide late yesterday and cannot be opened until the middle of next week, the state highway commission announced today. The detour around that section has also been blocked, leaving no road through that district.

of the government, including all of its activities, amounted to \$1,419,476,312, a decrease as compared with \$1,642,290,046 last year, while the general fund receipts totaled \$671,997,429, as compared with \$601,798,004 a year ago.

On the expenditure side there was \$100,000,000 devoted to the adjusted service certificate fund this year that was not included in the expenditures for the same period of last year. Banks Issue Currency. The treasury's month-end statement showed that in the five months of the fiscal year it had issued \$3,854,304,889 in securities and had retired in the same period a total of \$2,535,293,197. The statement showed that national banks were continuing to take advantage of the Glass-Steagall amendment to the home loan law and issuing currency backed by government securities bearing not more than 3% per cent interest. Since the law became effective last July the national bank currency outstanding has increased approximately \$165,000,000 and now amounts to \$875,880,908.
