BUTTER MARKET SAGS FOLLOWING SHARP ADVANCE

PORTLAND, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Weakness in the butter trade appears genuine. The previous sharp advance which appeared first at Portland and was then transferred to other coast points, appears out of line with conditions. Those who were chief boosters of the price when they secured a long line of butter at the lower prices, appear more than anxious to take profits that are not really in sight.

The price here remains mostly unchanged, but it is noted that the movement into coasting channels has been somewhat curtailed. A survey of the situation shows a greater sale of oleomargarine than for some time past.

Receipts of eastern butter continue along the coast, chiefly at California and Washington points. Market for eggs shows continued weakness in the local field as well as in the country generally. Prices are easier at most points with increasing lay and offerings. Price shading more or less general.

With pressure continued against springers, the market for chickens in general is inclined to rule more or less steady with this exception. Ducks and geese are slow. Hogs slower. Prices are being shaded somewhat on the potato market here with too many unsold rollers on the tracks. These are generally selling 5c to 10c central below the primary basis.

TURKEY GROWERS TO CUT HOLDINGS

PORTLAND, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Turkey growers are going to offer all the birds for the holiday trade the market can absorb. According to information disclosed by the latest survey of the industry at primary points of the Pacific northwest, there is not likely to be any holding back of supplies on account of the price.

Everyone in the trade expects a low price and will be very pleasantly surprised otherwise. Buyers are not making firm offers, practically all of them being inclined to pay an advance. Survey of the retail field suggests that Portland is going to consume more than the normal supply of turkeys for Christmas, but the exact volume will depend upon the price.

Irish Editorial Slams British Debt Dalliance

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Great Britain's note to the United States again urging suspension of the next installment of war debts was the subject of a bitter editorial in today's Irish Press, government organ.

"Britain acknowledges the debt and agrees, if driven to it, to pay in gold, which is the commodity it will most hurt the United States to receive," the newspaper said, "but she holds half a dozen pistols to America's head while calling on her to 'collect if you dare.' After which Britain condescend-

ingly agrees to discuss with the American government how best the payments may be postponed. "The principles underlying the British note are diametrically opposite to those Britain is applying in regard to the free state," the newspaper continues. "She is moved by no suggestion that the installments claimed from us are too great a burden for any people to bear. Not a day's quarter was given when the first disputed quarterly land annuities fell due. Britain at once leaped into war and began a blockade which she has ruthlessly maintained since."

The main items on the budget are as follows: General County fund, \$93,806.62; County schools, \$8,750.00; High school, \$7,000.00; County library, \$2,204.00; Market roads, \$1,150.00; Emergency fund, \$3,000.00; Elementary schools, \$6,000.00. There was no levy listed for the general road fund, and all items on the budget were reduced.

The amount to be raised by levy amounts to \$329,971.22. Last year it was \$383,820.66. Under the state law, a public hearing on the budget must be called within 20 days after the first publication of the budget. If called at the earliest possible date, it will be close to December 23. It is desired to have the public hearing before Christmas, if possible, so that it can be in the

hands of the assessor before January 1, as the law requires.
