

# Ashland, Medford, Traditional Grid Rivals Clash Here Tomorrow

## GAME WILL END FOOTBALL YEAR FOR TIGER TEAM

Burgher to Trundle Out Machine for Climax—Lithians Hope to Retrieve Repute by Capturing Contest

Coach Darwin Burgher will roll his 1932 football machine out of the garage tomorrow afternoon for its last ramble. The Tigers meet Ashland in a game which was postponed from Thanksgiving in order to permit the locals to journey to Portland for a test against Jefferson high school's champion outfit.

Despite the fact that Burgher's boys hit off more than they could conveniently chew in the Portland invasion, losing 33 to 0, their seasonal record shows them among the best teams turned out in Medford high school, winning all conference games. Their offensive has "clicked" almost continuously during the season and piled up a heavy lead over opponents. With a sterling line and tackle quick to trace the opponent's ball carrier, few teams have been able to get under way against the Burgherians.

Ashland, with a season's record blemished by defeats, will come to Van Scoyoc field Saturday filled to overflowing with the traditional "go or die" spirit which characterizes contests between Medford and the sister city representatives.

The Lithian lads, many times playing the "under dog" role, have shown flashes in previous games which swept the locals near defeat and added zest for the partisan fans.

The game will mean much to Ashland, for should her warriors succeed in humbling the Tigers, all previous defeats of the season will be forgotten and the team will return to a welcome that may be heard in Medford.

## ARGUMENT OVER ALL-AMERICANS GETS UNDER WAY

Center and Fullback Berths Lack Outstanding Candidates, Is Sport Writer's View; Many Names Heard

Two of the All-America berths that may be most difficult to fill this season, barring some fresh and outstanding developments, are center and fullback.

This is not to say there will be no major arguments over the rest of the makeup of the 1932 honor roll of gridiron performers, but the pivotal line and backfield positions have the experts scrambling around at a great rate for "dopes" and opinions.

Minnesota's Jack Manders appears to have gained an early lead over the other candidates for fullback, but his condition and consistency have been subject to some question.

Ernest Koy of Texas is being ranked as the greatest fullback of all time in the southwest conference.

Viviano Liked.

There probably is no better defensive back in the country than the Cornell captain, Bert Viviano. Coaches and players have told me they never saw a harder tackler anywhere than this New Jersey boy, who captained the Andover team before going to Ithaca.

For personal fire and team inspiration, Angel Brovelli of St. Mary's belongs well up on the fullback list. Bill Gibbons of Brown, Olson of Northwestern, Weinstein of Pittsburg, Poppelman of Maryland, Cain of Alabama, Hall of Oklahoma A. & M., Bauer of Nebraska and Horstman of Purdue all have attracted attention.

Dick Roberts of Vanderbilt, although nominally assigned to a halfback position, appeals to be an ideal fullback type, offensively as well as defensively.

Ely Stands Out.

Middle Western critics rate Lawrence Ely of Nebraska unusually high as a center. Fred Ware of Omaha says he doesn't think there is a better one anywhere, and coaches who have sent teams against the Cornhuskers praise Ely's ability to diagnose plays, tackle and direct most of his team's defense from a roving position.

One of the best centers on eastern grids is Hewitt Wilder, Columbia's converted fullback, who stepped in and filled the shoes of the sensational MacDuffee, described by Head Coach Lou Little last year as the best center he ever had. Wilder waged a great battle with Tom Gilbane, Brown star, who has a better offensive record than his Columbia rival.

Pete Gracy has stood out as the south's best center this season, although Jake Wade of Charlotte has nice things to say about William (Red) Espey of North Carolina State. Neblett of Georgia Tech and Lodrigues of Tulane have looked good.

Sooners Have Star.

Cehler of Purdue, Bernard of Michigan and Paul Young of Oklahoma have impressed mid-west critics. Young, a 190-pounder who stands 5 feet 3 inches, has been the "whole show" for the Sooners.

Oliver, U. C. L. A. captain, has looked good on the coast. Brock of Cornell and Engle of Pennsylvania have been kingpins in two strong eastern lines and Evans is a lightweight terror in Army's forward barrier.

The only criticism that can be made of Southern California's Trojans this season is that they have not been over-powering opposition in the customary fashion of teams developed by Howard Slaters Jones. They averaged only about 15 points for their first seven games of the 1932 season, as compared with a seven-year previous average, according to Ralph Huston, or 34.6 points per game.

The defensive record of the Trojans, on the other hand, is better than usual, yielding only seven points in as many games as compared with the seven-year yield of 5.5 points per contest.

Whatever hopes the University of Washington Huskies had of finding a wet field when they came to Los Angeles to meet the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles were shattered by the weather man today. Fair weather was forecast for tomorrow's gridiron struggle at the Memorial coliseum.

Accustomed to playing on wet fields in the northwest, the Huskies, arriving this morning from Seattle, were reported to have been hopeful it would rain before the contest so that the going would be according to their liking.

The Bruins, anxious to finish in second place in conference standings, were to end practice at the Westwood campus this afternoon. They are in top shape for the contest and Coach Bill Spaulding claimed the psychological advantage. The Bruins are determined to end their season with a victory after two successive defeats, one by St. Mary's and the other by Washington State.

## VETERANS SCARCE IN INITIAL LINEUP SONS BASKETBALL

SOUTHERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, Dec. 2.—(Sp1)—With a squad of 30 men, most of whom have distinct possibilities even though inexperienced and green to collegiate hoop competition, Coach Howard Hobson this week turned his attention from football to the 1932-33 basketball season which is now facing Southern Oregon Normal school.

Only three lettermen greeted Hobson at the initial workout and that trio composed of Bob Patterson, clever guard; Harold Fish, forward scoring ace, and Lyle Kinney, versatile utility man, along with a few other transfers, make up the whole of Hobson's experienced men around which he has to build his squad.

Medford's lone representative now on the squad is Estill Phipps, former Medford high school star under "Prink" Gallison and later a member of the Oregon freshman squad. It is understood here, however, that both Odd Hughes and George Harrington, brilliant players on Medford high five of the last few years, are to report for practice shortly.

Luminaries who reported to Hobson with brilliant records are such men as Ward Howell, gigantic six-foot-five high school center; Lyle Reeder, another former Lithia city star who last season played some brilliant ball for the Oregon frosh, is in suit. Zick Zwick, big guard who played his freshman competition at Purdue, is also making a fight for a first string job.

Outstanding among the former luminaries from the Portland inter-scholastic league who are now candidates for Hobson's cage team is "Chief" McLean, sensational Indian forward who made first team all-state last season while playing under Hobson at Benson Tech. Other ex-Portland men are Willard Jones, candidate for center to tip around 200 and stands six feet four, and Bud Jones, who stands about an inch shorter, George Yerkovitch is another hooper from the Hoop city.
