

Mid-West Places Four in '32 All-American Gridiron Combination

LINE OF BRAWN AND LIGHT FAST BACKS FEATURE

Associated Press Poll of Sports Writers And Officials Gives All-American Team—Far West Lags.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—(AP)—For the fourth successive year football stars who develop their brilliance in the great American midlands dominate the All-American team of 1932. Their margin over the other three main sectors of the gridiron battlefield is not so pronounced as in the past two seasons but, Mid-Western players occupy four of the first eleven positions in the honor line-up. The East and the South, including Texas, each gain three places and the Far West only one in the eighth annual All-American compiled by The Associated Press.

The All-American squad of 33 players, including the "shock troops" of the second and third elevens, numbers 12 from the East, eight from the Mid-West, seven from the South and six from the Far West. The selections climax a season in which great teams rather than great individuals, scintillated. There were a number of flashing ball-carriers especially in the South, but outstanding teams like Colgate, which was not scored on in nine straight victories; Texas Christian, Auburn, Michigan, and Purdue, all achieved fine records because of balanced, well-drilled strength.

Newman Stands Out
Fine support enabled Harry Newman, Michigan's resourceful and versatile quarterback, to emerge as one of the season's few dominating individuals. As a result of the stellar role he played in bringing about most of the Wolverine triumphs by passing, running or kicking, Newman was virtually the unanimous choice of the nation's experts for the job of quarterbacking the 1932 all-stars. He is without question the ablest field general since Frank Cardo piloted two straight unbeaten Notre Dame teams. He excels Cardo as a passer and ballcarrier.

Two other mid-western stars, Paul Moss, rangy Purdue end, and Joe Kurth, brilliant Notre Dame tackle, shared the distinction of being outstanding selections, although close observers felt there was little to choose in consistent performance between Kurth and his running mate in the Ramble line, Ed Krause. Don Zimmerman, Tulane's fleet back who had his greatest season despite the loss of experienced running mates, and Captain Milton Summerfelt, stalwart Army guard, also were clear-cut choices of the big majority of critics.

Injuries Shelve Three
The contests and rivalry for other positions all were keen as a variety of factors figured in the tabulation of final All-American results. Injuries balked the chances of Ernest (Pug) Rentner, Northwestern's 1931 all-star half-back, gaining this honor again. A broken ankle in mid-season against Harvard abruptly shelved Dick King, regarded by Major Ralph Sasse as one of the greatest ends in West Point history. The doctors kept Orville Mohler, Southern California's field general and the outstanding back on the Pacific coast, from finishing his career as an All-American.
