SELF EXPRESSION OF CHILD SOUGHT IN VALLEY SCHOOL

(By Mrs. L. A. Salade, Jr.)

We are living in an age which emphasizes the value of individuality and self-expression.

If our children do not have the proper foundation, they will not be prepared to enjoy this new freedom and will succeed in doing only that which they see others do.

If you encourage your child to participate in self-expression, a new type of management is needed and a definite foundation must be laid to avoid unfavorable results.

Very often it is necessary to re-educate the parents because outside forces are constantly changing and some parents are unaware of the numerous factors that handicap development of their children.

The creative instinct in children is a God given power and if we give them the proper outlet, we will be doing our share in improving the American home.

The art of living successfully means more than balancing the family budget. We are confronted with new problems every day. Our task lies in working them out wisely and intelligently and in teaching our children the value of self-reliance in everyday matters. It is sometimes necessary to deny ourselves the pleasure of shouldering their burdens if we wish them to have the practical experience so necessary to character building.

Dr. Bruce B. Robinson is a psychiatrist and has been recognized as an authority on child guidance.

Five years ago he was called to Newark, New Jersey by the board of education to organize a child guidance department for the city schools. Today he has under his care more than 75,000 school children.

He says there is one fundamental thing wrong in many homes today. We do not encourage children to mature. We think they should be guided and directed. We are making decisions for them that they should make for themselves. We are taking upon ourselves responsibilities that belong to them. We are interfering with their development. True, the mistakes we make are most commonly the mistakes of over-fondness or anxiety. The consequences are none the less devastating.
