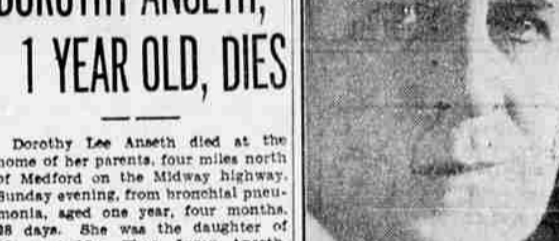

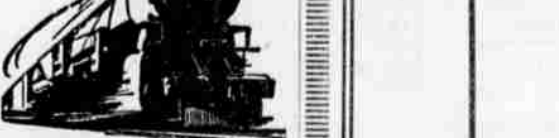

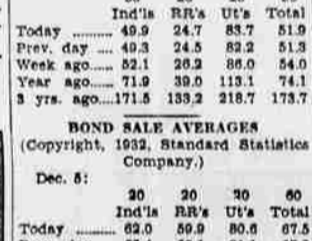

SIX-VOTE MARGIN DEFEATS GARNER LIQUOR PROPOSAL

(Continued from Page One) Once the vote was announced, confusion arose in the chamber. Speaker Garner had difficulty in restoring order.

There was so much confusion that Representative Small, Republican leader, repeated several times a demand for order.

Representative McDuffie, Democratic whip, then read a list of members absent, who he said would have voted for the resolution if they had been present.

They were five Democrats: Martin of Georgia, Garrett of Texas, and Harner of West Virginia.

Much of the opposition came from southern Democrats, who were re-elected to the next house.

Representative Michener, of Michigan, representative Republican leader, asked the speaker if a similar resolution would be brought up what his action would be.

Garner said "the chair will decide that when it's brought up."
