Mrs. Satchwell Elected Head Of Greater Medford Club

There was a decided spirit of enthusiasm prevalent among the women who met yesterday afternoon in the new club rooms of the city hall to reconvene the Greater Medford club and elect officers to complete the year, which closes in May. Officers named to head the organization were: Mrs. O. R. Satchwell, president; Mrs. M. J. Norris, vice-president; Mrs. Edwin L. Knapp, second-vice president; Mrs. Rose Scheffelin, recording secretary; Mrs. J. H. Cochran, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Alice Coppin, treasurer; and the following as directors: Mrs. A. J. Hanby, Mrs. R. C. Mulholland and Mrs. A. E. Heames.

Mrs. A. J. Hanby called the meeting to order and expressed her great appreciation of the realization of one of the outstanding dreams and purposes of this body of women, the establishment of a women's club center in this city.

The rooms, recently opened in the city hall, stand as an expression of achievement, she stated, and it was through the untiring efforts of the Greater Medford club that all women's organizations of Medford have been provided with this home.

Mrs. Scheffelin, who has been affiliated with the club for many years, stated that in addition to the club members' efforts in securing a home for women's clubs, they had functioned as a cultural, civic and beautification body, also cooperating with the government during the war and taking over as many responsibilities as the times demanded. She further stated that the club had never been philanthropic in character in the past, though giving moral support when necessary, but that with the stress of present times it would be necessary to include such work in the aims of the organization.

The new club president was introduced and took the chair to outline the work for the year. Mrs. Alice Coppin, chairman of the house committee, read the rules governing the use of the rooms and they were adopted by the body. These rooms are available to women's organizations and for private parties. Mrs. Coppin stated and anyone interested in using the rooms is asked to phone the chairman.

Plans for a card party were discussed by the club and the members voted to sponsor one in the near future and Miss Jane Snedcor was appointed chairman of the affair.

The club voted to revise the constitution and Meadames Scheffelin, Hanby and Cochran were appointed as a committee to make the revisions. Mrs. G. C. D'Albini was appointed press reporter for the organization.

The next meeting was announced for January 2, 1933.

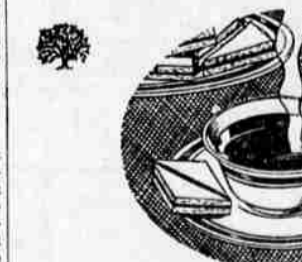

Ada Walker Jones passed away at the home of her son, Edward W. Jones, in Central Point at noon Monday at the age of 78 years.

Ada Walker was the eldest daughter of Edward and Mary Walker, and was born in Fayette county, Wisconsin, January 23, 1854. With her parents and two older brothers, she moved in infancy to La Crosse county, Wisconsin, where she grew to young womanhood, and for 13 years taught school in La Crosse, Monroe and Buffalo counties, Wisconsin.

In 1883 she was married to J. F. Jones and resided in Adams Valley, Wis. Two children were born, Edward W. Jones of Central Point and Hattie Jones Conley of Red Bluff, Cal.

After the death of her husband in 1916, she came west and has resided with her children since that time. Mrs. Jones was a member of the Presbyterian church at Ashland and of the West Salem, Wis., Eastern Star chapter.

Besides her children she leaves five grandchildren: Dorothy, Marjorie and Stanley Jones of Central Point, Nell and James Conley, Red Bluff, Cal.; also two sisters and two brothers, Frank B. Walker and Dr. Carrie L. Norvell, of Angels Camp, Cal.; N. D. of Denver, and Dr. Mary W. Frank of Chico, Cal.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. D. E. Millard at the Conger chapel at 2:30 Wednesday, after which the body will be taken to West Salem, Wis., for interment. Please omit flowers.
