Program of Tax Reduction through Legislative Measures will be drafted this afternoon by the taxation committee of the Chamber of Commerce, was the information given out today by W. H. Gore, chairman of the committee. There are several proposals which the committee will undoubtedly make to the Jackson county delegation to the state legislature bearing on remedies for present conditions in taxation matters.

One of the remedies to be advanced by the committee will undoubtedly include a proposal enabling partial payment of property taxes at shorter intervals than the half-year period now in vogue. It is felt that taxpayers generally will welcome the opportunity to pay taxes for a shorter period of time, thereby reducing the actual amount necessary to pay at any one time.

Proposals effecting the two-mill state school levy and the per capita levy for school purposes will also be considered at today's meeting. At a later date the committee will also consider the J. C. Barnes plan of tax reduction through exemptions on home owners' property.

HOMELESS MEN CROWD SHELTER HERE AT NIGHT

C. S. Stuart, chairman of the Lions Relief Kitchen committee, announced today that the men's shelter in the old Methodist church at the corner of Fourth and Barlett streets, will be kept open. Last night 23 men slept in the quarters, and Sunday night there were 18. Although such numbers of men have been staying at the shelter, there are only ten cots in the hall, there being no other furnishings, according to Mr. Stuart, and the need of so many more cots is decidedly evident. Each transient is only given two meals, and is then asked to continue his journey. The committee now plans to enlarge the sleeping room by moving the partition, and those in charge state that the high type of men staying there are eager and willing to do any work that they might be paid for their lodging. Only yesterday one man asked to do some carpenter work for those in charge, if he might have some needed clothing. Officer George J. PRODUCERS PRICE IS DISCUSSED AT MILK CONFERENCE

To determine the price to be paid the milk producer in Jackson county, the executive committee of the recently formed organization of producers and distributors is in meeting this afternoon. The price to the consumer on the distributor's product was determined last week-end and went into effect yesterday. The price of grade A whole milk agreed upon is eight cents a quart to cash customers, and nine cents a quart to 30-day customers. The price prior to the disturbance of last week in the milk market was 10 cents a quart. During the threatened milk war the price on whole milk went down to 10 cents a gallon. The condition led to the realization on the part of producers and distributors that a definite price should be agreed upon. An organization was formed and a committee appointed and given power to set prices for distributors and producers. On the committee in session this afternoon are: Dick Straus, George Gillman, W. C. Blankenship and Ted Gebauer.
