DEPRESSION HELD ADDED NEED FOR HEALTH FINANCES (Continued) An increase in tickets and other diseases of malnutrition and low vitality occurred in 1932, due to the depression. Newton D. Baker, national chairman of the Welfare and Relief Mobilization, said in a statement made public recently. His report was based on statistics compiled by hospitals, children's institutions, nutritionalists, camp directors and public health nurses.

It was said that while there was a slight decline in infant mortality in 28 cities in 1931 that "we shall undoubtedly reap a harvest of tuberculosis and other diseases in the next ten years from what the children today are suffering unless we redouble our efforts to maintain a decent minimum of living and health standards throughout the country."

Camp directors, the report said, noted among children of the poor lowered capacity for exercise. This lack of energy was much in evidence as it was difficult to help youngsters forget their home situations. "Children," Mr. Baker summed up, "have seen the security, which their parents have spent years in building, wiped out and have agonized with their elders over the ways of keeping the 'wolf from the door.' No child in the United States should be called upon to suffer in any of these ways. Public and private health services should be run at full efficiency during this crisis in order to guard the health of our boys and girls. In no other way can we remove the burden of handicaps from the next generation."

The Jackson County Public Health Association, through the sale of Christmas seals, has so far kept up its efficiency during the lines suggested for public health service. It can continue to do so only in so far as public support is given to it. Every seal sold at the small sum of one cent does its part toward maintaining the health standards of the country.

BOURBON SENATE CONTROL TO WAIT WASHINGTON, Dec. 6. - Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, said today the democrats would attempt to take control of the senate at this season. The democratic pilot made this statement to newspaper men after his party has given a plurality of one over the republicans with the swearing in of Walter Walker as senator from Colorado pending the qualification of Karl C. Schuyler, republican, expected in a few days.
