August Edler, 81, pioneer resident of this county, passed away at the home of this son at Beagle where he had gone for a short visit, at 9:15 p. m. Wednesday. Pneumonia was the cause of his death.

Mr. Edler was born in Germany and came to this country at the age of 12 years. He came west in the year 1874. From San Francisco he went by boat to Portland and then came to Medford as Ashland, and landed here at Medford now stands at 4:00 o'clock in the morning on July 4th, 1884. He immediately took up his residence in the Lake Creek district where he has resided continuously since that time.

Mr. Edler was the father of 11 children, nine living. They are August and Charles Edler and Mrs. Flora Frey of Lake Creek; Chris of Trail; William C. Frederick and Andrew Edler and Mrs. R. B. Bischoff of Beagle and Mrs. Louisa Beltz of Medford. Also 18 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

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WING GIVES TALK ON REAL ESTATE AT ROTARY MEET

Mr. Wing gave many facts and figures on this subject many of which were a revelation to his hearers. Over 150 billion dollars is invested in real estate today and only 25 percent of privately owned property is encumbered, according to the speaker. The fact that the amount of privately owned real estate in 1930 showed a substantial increase over the 1920 figure proved to the club that real estate was classified his talk into three parts covering urban property, suburban property and farms, giving some pertinent information on each type of real estate. A general discussion upon the subject will be held at next week's Rotary meeting and will be in charge of Mr. Wing.

(By the Associated Press) A premature thrust of winter sent shivers up and down a large portion of the North American continent today.

Striking suddenly from the Canadian northwest, the cold wave spread from the Pacific northwest, across the west and middle west, and even into the southwest, bringing suffering to all those unprepared for the onslaught.

Routing spring-like weather in many parts of the country, the icy blast described by the weather bureau as resulting from a gigantic condition of high pressure, over-spread the affected areas, bringing sub-zero temperatures.

Cold in Montana An unofficial temperature reading at Georgetown Lake near Anaconda, Mont., recorded 30 degrees below zero. Thief Falls, Minn., had 25 below, while in Wallace, Idaho, a blizzard, with 11 below was raging.

Temperatures in the east were sagging. Baltimore, Washington and Pittsburgh, reported a rapid downward movement of temperatures, and the weather man said the extreme cold could count on a cold snap today, with a continuation of low temperatures in those sections of the nation already affected.
