Snow Flake Recipes

Pork Chops a la Robert.
16 Snow Flake Crackers
2 cups sliced cooking apples
1/2 cup sliced onion
6 loin pork chops
Salt and pepper.
Into a greased baking dish put alternate layers of crackers, apples and onions. Season and lay chops on top. Season meat and bake covered (375 degrees F) for 40 minutes. Uncover and brown. Serves 6 portions.

Brownies.
24 Snow Flake Crackers, crumbled fine
1 egg
1/4 cup melted butter
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 tablespoons water
2 squares chocolate
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup nut meats, chopped.
Beat egg slightly and stir in melted butter and sugar. Add water, beat and stir in melted chocolate. Mix crumbled crackers, baking powder and nut meats and stir into egg mixture. Bake in a greased cake pan 25-30 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F). Cool and cut into squares.

ROAD CONTRACTS LET WEDNESDAY WILL GIVE WORK

Contracts will be awarded Wednesday, December 14, for the Siskiyou rerouting of the Pacific highway and the Central Point cutoff on the same road, and a number of update contracts, including Von der Hellen & Pierson and McNutt Brothers of Eugene, spent today going over the route in the Siskiyou preparatory to submitting bids.

Work is expected to start soon after the letting of the contracts. While the projects will furnish some employment to local residents, it will not be as large as many expect. High-powered machinery will take the place of men, the contractors said, and the specifications of the contract are based upon its use.
On county emergency road work 200 men from all parts of the county were engaged today and practically the same number will be assigned next week. They are engaged in making repairs, filling up holes and doing other odd jobs needed in the maintenance of roads. The work available far from meets the requirements of the \$200 registered in the county as in need of work.

Yesterday afternoon was the regular day for assignment of work. The county court room was filled this morning with the overflow.
One of the topics to be discussed at the public hearing on the tax budget for 1933 will be the appropriation of the emergency road work.
