RETURN WOCKNER TO CRIME SCENE

Warren Wockner, 25, wanted in Waukega, Ill., for kidnaping a banker, and with two accomplices holding him prisoner in an effort to compel him to open the bank vaults, left the past week for the mid-west, where he will stand trial. His two companions are serving prison terms. Wockner was arrested two weeks ago in a trapper's cabin in the Trail district. He has kin in that section, who knew nothing of Wockner's activities. The accused had been in southern Oregon during the past summer.

Wockner was in custody of A. Phillips, an Illinois officer, who has known Wockner for several years. The prisoner, when he left here, wore an "Oregon boot" to forestall any escape attempt. Wockner is asserted to have boasted that he would never go to the penitentiary, and to have warned Phillips he would escape, if he had a chance.

KELLY'S RECORD CITED IN VOTER

This week's issue of the "Oregon Voter" prints the following biography of Edward C. Kelly of this city, elected to the legislature, at the last general election:

"Out of Medford high school at 18, into University of Oregon at 19, out of the university as a full-fledged lawyer at 22, six years of experience in the practice of law, and into the Oregon legislature at 28—such is the speed shown by Ed C. Kelly of Medford, son and law partner of the formidable fighting futurist of the Medford bar, Col. E. E. Kelly.

"At U. of O., Ed made the football team and won fame as its chief debater. He now is elected state representative from Jackson county, the first Democratic legislator elected from that county for 20 years, or since the late Clarence Reames. His tremendous personal popularity in and around Medford is cited by the local press as the cause of his election. Born August 6, 1904, at Blackfoot, Idaho; to Medford 1908; he will be the second youngest member of the 1933 legislature, the youngest being William L. Dickson, three years his junior."
