ESTHER M'COLLUM,  
FORMER TEACHER,  
PASSES IN ALASKA

A telegram from Cordova, Alaska, was received here yesterday telling of the death Saturday at midnight of Miss Esther McCollum, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. N. McCollom of this city and for several years an instructor in the Medford schools. The exact cause of Miss McCollom's death was not revealed.

The first telegram, telling of her illness, was received by the McColloms Thursday and stated that she was seriously ill and in the Cordova hospital, where she was receiving excellent care. On Friday a second wire was received announcing that she had passed the crisis, was out of danger and improving. Yesterday afternoon the third wire came, announcing her death.

In the first telegram, it was stated that a letter in explanation had been mailed. The letter has not been received here and the McColloms stated today that they are afraid it was on the boat which was recently wrecked on the northern coast.

Earlier in the fall Miss McCollom had written her parents that she was ill with influenza. She had returned to teaching in Cordova, where she has had a position in the schools for the past year and a half, however, and was thought to be in good health, when the telegram was received, telling of her recent illness.

It is thought that she suffered a relapse from influenza or other complications resulting from the attack. Her cousin, Lola McCollom of Fairbanks, Alaska, was on her way to Cordova, when news of Miss McCollom's sudden passing was received.

Miss McCollom, a graduate of Cheney normal school in Washington, was an instructor in the Jackson school here for several years and was prominent in school and social activities of the city, where she had a large circle of friends.

SACASA WAITED,  
NOW HE SEES HIS  
HOPES FULFILLED

WASHINGTON—A scholarly and affable man, a familiar figure around the capital for a number of years, more than likely has set down as his favorite maxim—"All comes to him who waits."

He is Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, Nicaraguan minister to the United States and just elected president of that republic.

The lanky Nicaraguan, who received his education in the United States and who is fond of saying that this is his "second native land," thus returns to govern a country whence he fled some seven years ago.

Sacasa was vice president of Nicaragua back in 1925 when General Chamorro staged a coup d'etat and took over the government of the country. Sacasa then left the country for Mexico and Guatemala.

His departure changed the political course of his country and may be the policy of the American government toward Nicaragua.

Sacasa's absence led to the recognition by the United States of the government under the presidency of Diaz. Under the Nicaraguan constitution, which provided that upon the absence of the president and vice president, the congress shall designate one of its members to complete the unexpired term. Diaz was recognized by the United States.

Sacasa contended that he was the constitutional president. It is interesting to speculate, now that it is all over, just what would have happened had Sacasa managed to remain in his native country back in 1925.

He might have ascended to the presidency then instead of seven years later. The United States might have given him moral if not actual physical support to hold on to his government. United States marines might not have been dispatched to supervise subsequent elections in that country.

Henry L. Stimson might not have named him his secretary of state. And had he not brought peace between warring factions there and been rewarded for his efforts by being made governor-general of the Philippines, President Hoover, who had never seen him, might not have named him his secretary of state.

But Sacasa, despite his being a bit tardy in realizing his ambition to become president of Nicaragua, in the meantime has not been left out entirely.

In the elections, supervised by American marines, his old friend and colleague Moncada was elected president. Moncada named him Nicaraguan minister to Washington.

And it must be something to any old wounds that he might have to know that he was elected president in the recent elections over his two old political enemies—Diaz for president and Chamorro for vice president.

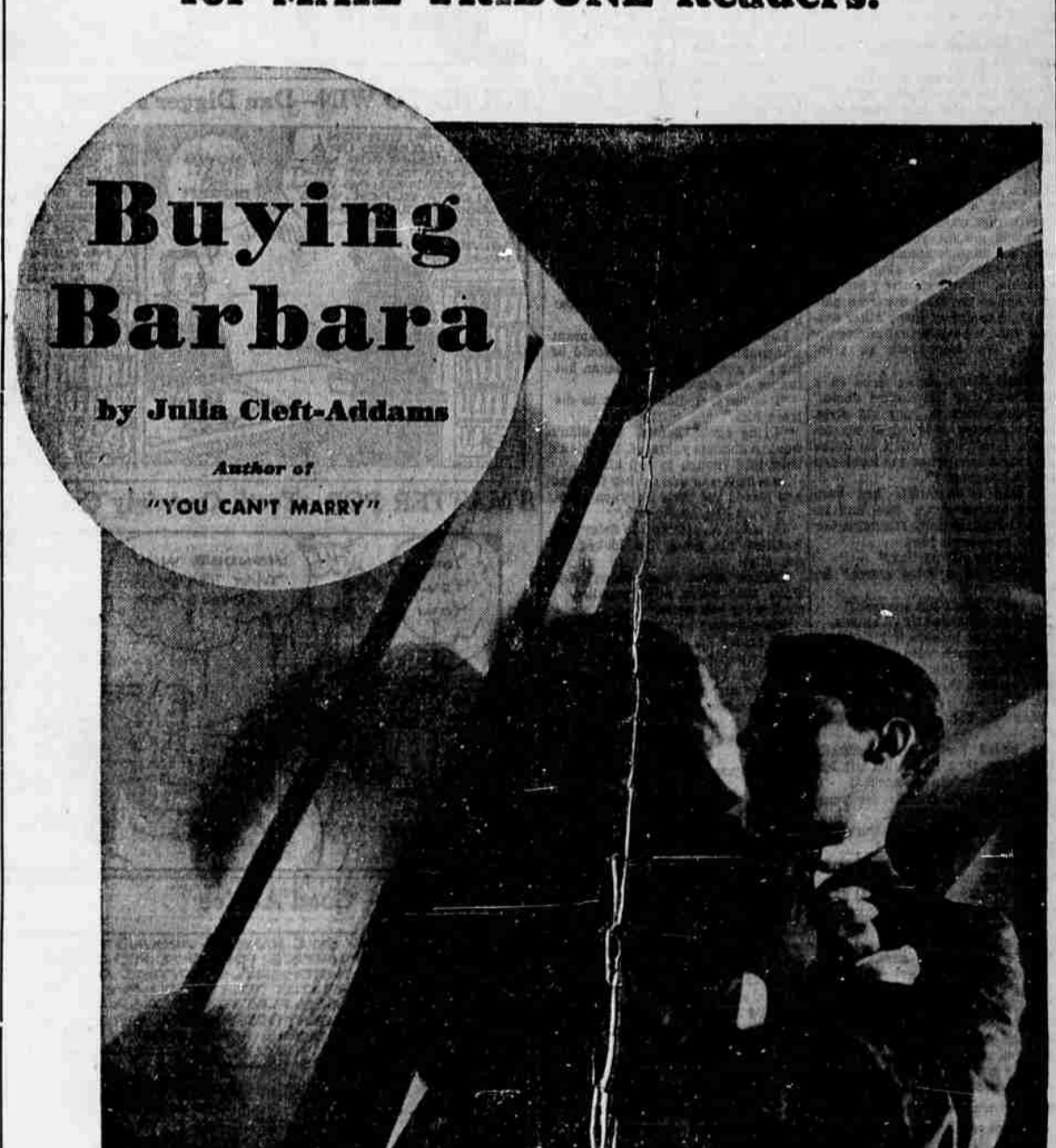
