Greater Medford Club Postpones Benefit

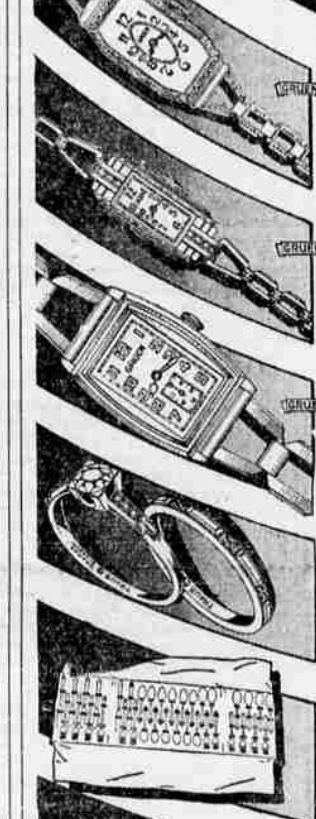
At a meeting of the board of the Greater Medford club this morning, it was decided to postpone the benefit card party and vaudeville planned for Friday evening of this week.
