default of these nations would do to their credit standing or to their relations with the United States. Secretary Mills said the outcome was "purely speculative" and no other official would venture anything more definite. Mills said normal relations between this country and those which do not pay need not necessarily be disrupted.

No Pay in Bullion He cited Russia which, though not diplomatically recognized since the Russian regime took control of the nation, still has trade relations with this country.

None of the \$144,934,421 being paid today will come into the treasury in the form of bullion for the present. Payment, officials explained, is in the form of a bookkeeping entry; the remittances being credited to the account of the United States probably in the New York Federal Reserve bank.

The latter will probably withdraw the foreign gold a bit at a time, as a single shipment totaling the \$95,850,000 being transferred by Great Britain could be insured.

Despite the certainty that France would not pay, the United States today was in the peculiar position of having no official word to that effect.

TURKEY GROWERS RECEIVE FAT SUM

ROSEBURG, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Distribution of approximately \$6,500 to turkey growers who participated in the Thanksgiving pool is being made from the Roseburg office of the Oregon Turkey Growers. The payment is the first on account in addition to the advance tendered at time of delivery. It is expected that another payment to growers will result from this pool when final settlement occurs. Growers were given an advance on a basis of 10 cents per pound for prime young toms and hens at the time of delivery, and the additional payment brings the total to 17 cents.

The association expects to organize another pool shortly after the first of January, it was announced today.

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DAIRY SITUATION IN SOUTHERN OREGON IS DISCUSSED AT MEET

The dairy situation of southern Oregon and northern California was discussed last night at a meeting of the Dairymen's association at the county court house, attended by a small representation of followers of the industry in this section.

W. A. Gates, merchant and cannerman, who has done much to promote the southern Oregon tomato during the past year, gave the association an interesting talk on farm products from the retailer's standpoint. Medford buyers are loyal to local products, he pointed out, and local dairy products bring more money on the Medford market than is paid in Portland.

C. A. Frevort, manager of the Del Norte creamery at Smith river; Floyd Bennett, manager of the Bandon Cheese and Produce company, and Neil Craig of Crescent City were visitors at the meeting and spoke briefly on the dairy situation on the coast.

R. G. Fowler, county agent, brought considerable interesting information to the members and forecast a brighter future for the dairy industry and for southern Oregon through success of the dairy industry.

of an old statute he showed a two-reel film of Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle last week.

The Arbuckle films were banned from Portland by an ordinance passed eight years ago following the Arbuckle scandal. The censor board here granted Saad a permit for the picture, but later revoked it when it was discovered the eight-year-old ordinance continued in force.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Organized farm groups urging the domestic allotment relief plan before the house agriculture committee today, said they favored preservation of "all that is good in the farm board act, that is, all except the stabilizing provisions."
