Who Will Fill Garner's Shoes? Four in Race Already

Others Expected To Enter Fight For Speakership In 73rd Congress

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The powerful post of speaker in the new 73rd congress is being actively sought by four leading democrats of varying views.

Another quartet of possible contenders may enter the field before a selection is made at a Democratic caucus, probably in March. Despite the time remaining before the actual selection, the importance of the post is such that it probably will command much attention at the present short session.

The office will be vacated by Speaker John N. Garner on March 4 when he becomes vice-president and presiding officer of the senate. Candidates already in the race are Representatives Henry T. Rainey of Illinois, Democratic floor leader; Joseph W. Byrns of Tennessee, chairman of the important appropriations committee; John McDuffie of Alabama, party whip, and John E. Rankin of Mississippi, chairman of the veterans' committee.

Others May Seek Post. The possible contenders are Representatives Lindsey C. Warren of North Carolina, chairman of the accounts committee; John W. McCracken of Massachusetts, member of the ways and means committee; John P. O'Connor of New York, and Arthur H. Greenwood of Indiana, both members of the rules group.

Garner was elected speaker a year ago when the Democrats seized the house from 12 years of Republican control. The Texan was the first Democratic speaker since the late Champ Clark of Missouri, who wielded the gavel during the Wilson administrations.

All Are Veterans. Both Rainey and Byrns are veterans of a quarter of a century of service in the house. McDuffie, Rankin and other contenders are all of long time service but entered congress after the world war period.

Coming to congress 28 years ago, Rainey became leader in the present house, after establishing a reputation as a student of domestic and international affairs. A large energetic man of 73 years, he is distinguished by his shock of snowy white hair, his ability as a debater and knowledge of tariff and revenue legislation.

Byrns has been elected for his 13th term from the sixth Tennessee district. Besides heading the biggest committee in congress, he has been chairman of the Democratic national congressional committee for four years.

The Tennesseean, tall and quiet spoken, is reputed to have the best knowledge of governmental expenditures of any member in congress. In debate, he handles himself ably.

McDuffie, representing the first Alabama district, has been in congress 14 years. He has been an ardent advocate and vigorous defender of Democratic principles. Because of his close acquaintance with legislative problems he was made whip several years ago.

Rankin has been a doughty supporter of cash payment of the soldiers' bonus and inflation of currency. He has fought the sales tax. The Mississippian has support in the liberal wing of the party.

Warren has been mentioned as speakership timber because of the manner in which he has presided over the house during trying times in the last session.

O'Connor has been boomed by friends from eastern states. A New England group has suggested McCracken, and several in the Indiana delegation are espousing the cause of Greenwood.



Despite the crush of important legislation facing the short session of congress, the race for speakership of the new house is commanding attention. Henry T. Rainey of Illinois, Joseph W. Byrns of Tennessee, John McDuffie of Alabama, and John E. Rankin of Mississippi are actively seeking the post, while others are being mentioned. The selection probably will not be made until March.

DEER FROZEN IN POND AT ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Dec. 15.—(Sp.)—Death stalked at the city warehouse Tuesday evening when all efforts of city water and light department employees to save the life of a fine four-point buck which had been frozen in the ice on the upper part of the Reservoir Gulch reservoir failed.

FREAK APPLE IS RED ON INSIDE

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 15.—(AP)—You've heard of "red" apples, and apples with "rosy cheeks," but where can anyone get an apple that's red all the way to the core?

Offhand, University of Minnesota farm school professors will tell you they know of one place and that is from Congressman-elect F. H. Shoemaker, farmer-laborer.

Years of amateur experimenting—Burbanking, as he terms it—in his backyard at Appleton, Wis., where he used red pulp.

Professor W. H. Alderman, chief of the division of horticulture at the college of agriculture, said the apple is an interesting variation which he expects to use in further experimentation, hoping to cross it with types to improve the quality while retaining its unusual features.

Willamette Frozen Above Oregon City

OREGON CITY, Dec. 15.—(AP)—For the first time in several years the Willamette river is frozen over above the Oregon City bridge. The ice is thin, however. The upper river and falls are frozen over with but little water going over the falls. The Crown-Willamette mills were closed Monday because of the ice.

Grocer Found Dead In Closed Garage

GLADSTONE, Ore., Dec. 15.—(AP)—The victim of a heart attack and asphyxiation, Richard Freytag, 61, a grocer here for 26 years, was found dead in his garage last night. He had started the machine and probably stepped back to open the garage door, which closed automatically, when he was overcome by a heart attack. The body was found beneath the running motor in the closed garage.
