DRESSED TURKEYS STRIKE NEW LOW

PORTLAND, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Still another low price record has been established here for dressed turkeys of top grade with practically no business in sight at the moment above 14c. The low point continues at a dime, but if any really poor quality birds appeared, there was some question as to whether they could be sold. The 2c of today would pass in normal years as a fairly good bird.

Perhaps the chief new factor appears to be the keen desire of large distributors to get their birds into place where they can be moved into consumers' hands. Offers of consignments of turkeys are being freely made which means that the large retailers are going to be mighty slow about paying out cash in advance for their probable Christmas needs. This indicates weakness underlying even current all-time low price records.
