PIPES FROZEN UP; HUGE MILL BURNS

MONTEBANO, Wash., Dec. 16. (AP)—Frozen water pipes in the water system of the Schaefer Brothers' lumber mill, which prevented employees from obeying a fire discovered before it gained great headway, were blamed by officials today for a \$154,000 fire last night.

The huge sawmill, major part of the plant, was practically completely destroyed, together with thousands of feet of sawed lumber lying nearby in the yards, and between 120 and 130 men will be thrown out of work. Through the use of a tug hurriedly pressed into service, the lumber boat Hubert Schaefer, which was lying at a dock beside the mill, was pulled to safety when it was endangered.

FIELD MEETINGS TO DEMONSTRATE PRUNING METHOD

A series of field meetings for the purpose of demonstrating modern and approved methods in pruning fruit trees are to be held in various parts of the county during the period December 20 to 22, inclusive, according to announcement made by L. P. Wilcox, county agent.

Fruit growers and others who are interested in fruit raising will find it worth their while to attend at least one of these meetings.

The schedule of times and places is as follows: Tuesday, December 20, 10 a. m., Homer Moore orchard, one and one-half miles south of the Southern Oregon Normal school on the boulevard. Pruning will be discussed and demonstrated. At 2 p. m., Thornton Wiley orchard, 681 Walnut street, Ashland. Apples, cherries and grapes will be pruned.

Wednesday, December 21, 10 a. m., A. Amundsen orchard, two miles west of Talent on Beeson lane. At 2 p. m., J. B. Kirk orchard, one mile east of Phoenix on the Fern Valley road. Thursday, December 22, 10 a. m., Clazy orchard, two and one-half miles west of Medford on the Jacksonville highway. At 2 p. m., A. V. Carlson orchard, two and one-half miles north of Central Point on the Pacific highway.

All meetings will start promptly, therefore, those planning to attend should be at the orchard by schedule time.

GLEEMEN GOING ASHLAND TONIGHT

Members of the Medford Gleemen are requested to meet at the Chamber of Commerce at 8 o'clock this evening, from where they will go to Ashland to participate in the formal opening of the Lithia Springs theater, recently taken over under the management of the Leverette theaters. Forty members of the chorus, under the direction of James Stevens, are expected to make the trip.

This will mark the Gleemen's first appearance outside of Medford, and will also be the first of many public presentations which the civic chorus will make. Plans for future excursions to Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and other communities are now being considered, according to Dr. E. W. Shockey, president of the group. The Gleemen will sing a group of five numbers in their presentation in Ashland tonight, taken from the program presented in Medford last week when they made their first appearance in concert. Sebastian Apollo, pianist and assistant director, will render the accompaniment for the Gleemen.

HORNSBY THINKS CARDS WILL WIN LEAGUE PENNANT

ST. LOUIS.—(AP)—Rogers Hornsby, the player-manager who has been shored around the National league quite a bit in his 18 seasons of big time baseball, believes his new-old teammates—the Cardinals—will be out in front again in the 1933 race.

"I can't see how anybody can lick the Redbirds," panted Rogers, pausing in one of the strenuous workouts he takes five days a week and which he intends to keep up until time to go south in the spring. Medicine ball, stall bars, pulleys, rowing machine and 10 laps of an indoor track are helping the Cards' star second sacker of other years to shed the 10 or 15 pounds he doesn't need.

"I'm not figuring on any trouble from the Cubs," the Bruins' late manager continued. "Last season their pitchers carried them, and they won't be as strong as they were last year."

The Cubs will face the toughest opposition of any club, he asserts, because "all the teams try harder against pennant winners."
