

TIGERS OUTCLASS SUPERVARSITY TO CHALK 28-14 WIN

Cagers Battle On Even Terms First Period—Burger Sends in Subs in Third—Cubs Trim C. P.

It was one of those basketball games where neither team scored a point in the first quarter, the losing team only had one point at the half, and the underdog came through with a victory.

Medford high made it two straight over University of Oregon teams by defeating the college supervarsity, 28-14 last night. A year ago Medford beat the Oregon freshmen, 23-13, the first time history records such an upset. Medford was doped to lose last night's game, but surprised coaches and spectators alike.

For the entire first quarter the two teams battled on even terms, neither being able to sink a shot. The second quarter was half over before Lindsey, Medford center, finally dropped in a crumple. At the half Medford lead, 6-1, and showed the count 18-3 at the end of the third canto.

Coach Burger ran in some subs and the Oregon men put on a rally that netted them 11 points to Medford's 10. Red Scheel was high point man with 9, with Hugg leading the invaders with 6 points. Most of the Oregon men were former Salem high players, Kitchener having been an all-state man a few years back.

The Tiger Cub five defeated Central Point high school, 17-16, in an amusing game that combined tumbling and football with basketball. Bob Sherwood lead the Cub pack with 9 points.

COLLEGE CAGERS HOPE FOR SECOND SHOT AT NORMAL

Medford may get to see a college basketball team in action yet. Two games are being talked by sport fans of the city, one remaining the University of Oregon and Southern Oregon Normal school here when Oregon returns from its barnstorming trip around San Francisco. The other is a game between Oregon State college and the normal five.

After Oregon was given a drubbing at Ashland Monday night, Billy Reinhart wanted to give his men another shot at the Normal five. Cap Robertson, captain and center, and Jim Robertson, first string forward, were on the bench and Reinhart feels that Oregon will be able to give a better account of itself on a larger floor, with his team at full strength.

The chances of bringing the Corvallis quintet here are somewhat slim, although the Beavers, with Red MacDonald in the lineup, would draw as well as Oregon.

Coach Hobson of Normal has expressed his willingness of meeting Oregon again, with Friday, January 6, as the preferred date. The game which was played on the Ashland junior high "crackerbox" floor Monday night might have been staged in Medford had negotiations with the local high school authorities been successful.

The high school did not want to have a big game here on the night before their tilt with the Oregon supervarsity 'set night, but the small attendance at the supervarsity game may have changed their minds. The Oregon-Normal game at Ashland saw a large crowd of Medford fans present.

BABE PLANS "PRO" DEBUT COON ASSERTS MOTHER

DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Mildred (Babe) Didrikson, phenomenal girl athlete, resigned her job and drove south toward the Gulf of Mexico last night, leaving sports followers to puzzle over reports she planned to turn professional and that she was considering matrimony.

Miss Didrikson apparently was on her way to her Beaumont home to spend the holidays with her family, but she could not be found. Mrs. C. Didrikson said she understood that her daughter, who recently was suspended by the Amateur Athletic union because she allegedly endorsed a motor car, expected to turn professional.

At Houston the athlete's sister, Mrs. Esther Elam, laughed at reports that Babe was to be married. She said there was "absolutely nothing to it."

A typewritten statement was issued to Houston papers as coming from Miss Didrikson. It was confirmed by Mrs. Elam as authentic. One paragraph read:

"This is my last word concerning my suspension. So far as I am concerned, it is a closed incident. Newspapers and the public must be tired of the whole business. I know I am."

Miss Didrikson has repeatedly denied the allegation of which she supposedly lost her amateur rating. But her suspension upset her plans for playing basketball with the Golden Cyclones, a team sponsored by
