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MRS. INLOW, PIONEER OF JACKSON COUNTY DIES AT RIPE AGE

Mrs. Serepta Ellen Inlow, pioneer resident of Jackson county in various parts of which she has resided for more than 70 years, died in Jacksonville at 3:00 a. m. Friday at the age of 80 years.

Mrs. Inlow was born at Eugene, Oregon, Aug. 24, 1852 and when a small child, came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Winters to Jackson county where she has since resided. Her father was a scout during the Indian hostilities and took part in the famous Hungry Hill battle in the Wolf creek country.

Mrs. Inlow, with her family, has resided in Ashland, Talent, Eagle Point and in the nineties, moved to Trail where for 12 years she was post mistress there.

She was a long time member of the Baptist church and in the early days before the public schools, she attended the academy at Jacksonville.

She leaves three sons, Fred Inlow of Trail; Harvey E. of La Grande, Ore. and Arthur Morrison by a former marriage of Lions, Ore.

Funeral services will be held at the Antioch cemetery at 2:30 Tuesday with Rev. Stillie of Trail officiating.
