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ROOSEVELT AND DAVIS CONTINUE DEBT DISCUSSION

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 27—(AP)—President-elect Roosevelt and Norman H. Davis continued today their private discussion of world disarmament, war debts and economic. The American diplomat told Mr. Roosevelt last night there are favorable signs on the disarmament horizon.

Mr. Davis, who was sent by President Hoover as American delegate to the disarmament conference at Geneva, remained as an overnight guest at the executive mansion after a fire-side conference with the president-elect.

After another talk with Mr. Roosevelt this morning, Mr. Davis' plans took him to New York for a meeting with American members of the committee on agenda for the world economic conference which he said would probably be in London early next summer.

He arrived at the executive mansion late yesterday afternoon a few minutes after Governor Roosevelt himself had returned from Hyde Park, where he spent Christmas with his family.
