

### FEW CHANGES IN FOOTBALL RULES BELIEVED NEEDED

#### Meeting of College Heads and Coaches Convinced Present Regulations Make Game Safer for Players

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—(AP)—College athletic heads and coaches, here for the annual meetings of the National Collegiate A. A., a 3d related organization, already have set one new record, although their first formal session was not slated until today.

In the opinion of veteran observers, a new all-time low in the matter of "viewers-with-alarm" seemed assured. Convention programs were conspicuous for their singular lack of subjects likely to provide controversial discussion.

#### Football Main Topic

As in the past, football was the chief item of college sport listed for exhaustive examination. But even here there seemed to be no outstanding problems, certainly none so serious as last year when a death toll of 60 forced a revision of the rules in the interest of safety.

Despite the fact that the 1932 campaign brought with it 43 deaths attributed, directly or indirectly to football, the new rules, it is generally agreed, have made the game safer for the players. So satisfactorily has the code worked, in fact, that few, if any, changes are contemplated for the 1933 season.

#### Dead Ball Moot Point

Some argument may develop over the "dead ball" rule which makes the ball "dead" when any part of the carrier's body except his hands or feet touches the ground, but even this provision seems to have the backing of majority opinion.

The most important single item of business on the N. C. A. A. program is the selection of a new chairman of the football rules committee to succeed the late E. K. Hall. Most prominently mentioned in connection with the post have been William S. Langford, Jr., secretary of the committee for a quarter century; Walter Oleson, commissioner of eastern officials; and Amos Alonzo Stagg, retiring head coach at Chicago.

#### Jockey Gilbert Sets Up Record

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Johnny Gilbert has set up a new modern record for American jockeys. The cool, stolid youngster from Pittsburgh, Kas., hung up a triple at Jefferson park yesterday and ran his total winners for the season to 208, the best mark any American riding star has achieved since Vincent Powers rode 324 in 1908.
