

# ELIZABETH MANN BELOVED PIONEER TO LAST REWARD

Elizabeth Mann, one of our few remaining beloved pioneers, passed to her reward at her home in Central Point, Oregon December 26, at 6 a. m. after a very short illness. Although she was past 80 years of age her death was unexpected, as she was very active up until the last. She was a resident of southern Oregon for 44 years. Mrs. Mann was born at Clay county, Missouri, in August, 1851.

She and her husband, William Mann, now deceased, started from Kansas in 1879, with an emigrant train, taking their four children, Joe Mann, John Mann, Preston Mann, Mrs. Susan Irwin (Preston Mann is now deceased). The train consisted of 180 wagons and approximately 1000 people. They had minor difficulties on the road, and twice the Indians stampeded their stock, which delayed them for several days. From Kansas they came directly to Portland, Ore., taking all summer to make the trip. From Portland they went to Grand Ronde, Ore. (now La Grande), thence to Modoc in Klamath county, and Modoc to Central Point, by way of Crater lake in September, 1888, taking two days to make the trip.

Mrs. Mann was a very courageous mother and wife, and one of those wonderful persons who helped blaze the trail and helped build this great northwest. She will be mourned and missed by a host of friends both in northern and southern Oregon.

She leaves three children, two sons, Joe Mann and John Mann of Central Point, and Mrs. Susie Irwin of California, six grandchildren, 7 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl Funeral Home Friday at 2 o'clock. Rev. J. M. Johnson officiating. Interment at Central Point cemetery.

# PLURIES CITATION IN SCHERMERHORN RECOUNT PETITION

A "pluries citation" was filed this afternoon by Attorney Porter J. Neff in the recount petition against Gordon L. Schermerhorn. An affidavit accompanied the "pluries citation," setting forth that Coroner W. H. Conger has been unable to find Schermerhorn within the confines of Jackson county. A "pluries citation" is not as bad as it sounds, and, in plain English, stripped of legal verbiage, means "the third citation."

Coroner Conger, who acts as sheriff, in matters in which the sheriff is legally concerned, makes daily visits to the Schermerhorn home in an effort to locate him.

According to reports received by Attorney Neff's office, Schermerhorn is in Treka, Calif., and vicinity, but is expected to show up at the court house next Tuesday morning to be sworn in as sheriff when the coroner will serve the citation upon him.

This accomplished, Schermerhorn, through counsel, will move, it is said, to block the recount, upon legal grounds.

Under Oregon law, a recount must be held, "in not less than three days, nor more than seven days," after service has been made.

The official count gave Schermerhorn a majority of 123 in the race for sheriff, over Ralph G. Jennings, "write-in" candidate at the last election. The petition asserts that 381 Jennings votes were discarded by election boards on technicalities and that Jennings was elected sheriff by not less than 97 votes.
