

BULLET IN BRAIN, AGED MAN LIVES OLD DAYS AGAIN

Medford, O., Dec. 30. — (AP) — A bullet has been lodged in the brain of 39 days, Irvin Weygandt, 62-year-old farmer, continued today to live precariously to life. Stranger to him may partly recover, said Dr. Thomas.

Weygandt presented the paradox of being half alive, half dead, as his actual personality is in a state of suspended animation. In his mind, he believes he is 50 years old, and he plowed the fields of his farm. He doesn't know he tried to commit suicide by shooting himself with a small caliber rifle. He doesn't know how seriously he is hurt. Most of the time he thinks he still is driving imaginary horses, or planning to do some service for his neighbors of a half century ago.

His happiest moments are when friends tie lines to the bed, and let him hold them. Like reins to his plow team.

Dr. Thomas believes the bullet is lodged in the frontal lobe of Weygandt's brain, thus accounting for the fact that other nerve centers still are functioning.

Wimer Woman Dies Of Auto Injuries

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 30. — (AP) — Mrs. C. H. Stam, 65, for the Wimer district, died here Thursday from a skull fracture suffered when she was struck by an automobile driven by Milton Abbott of Blue Lake, Cal. ARREST FOLLOWS WOMAN'S HEARING BY GRAND JURORS

Mrs. Judd was given an opportunity by the grand jury to carry out her repeated expressions of a desire to "tell all" after the Arizona supreme court had denied her a new trial. Later the court declined to consider her petition for a rehearing, and she faces execution February 17.

Mrs. Judd's testimony before the grand jury Wednesday marked the first time her story had been told before such an inquisitorial body. She was not indicted for the murder of Mrs. Levoi, but went to trial on a murder complaint of the county attorney. The charge still pending against her in connection with the slaying of Miss Samuelson is in similar form.

Reports, while unofficial, generally were that the condemned woman's grand jury testimony had not implicated anyone in the actual slaying, which she was reported to have said she perpetrated alone, in self defense, but that she sought to bring others into the case when she found herself confronted with the problem of disposal of the bodies and escape from detection.

CHILEAN FOOD CRISIS EASED

SANTIAGO, Chile. — (AP) — Scarcity of prime necessities has begun to lessen, and seizures of wheat and other foodstuffs in private warehouses and stores are diminishing, government officials say.

The improvement is due largely to purchases of wheat in Argentina, increasing of firms to bring in foreign sugar and an increase in Chile's own garden truck.

Officials believe that the resumption of good trade relations with Argentina will be the chief factor in solving food problems here, and in ending hoarding.

SLOW-LEARNING CHILDREN DENIED PROPER TUTORING

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30. — (AP) — More than 30 departmental meetings were held here today by educators of the state as the third and concluding day of the 33rd annual meeting of the Oregon State Teachers' association opened. The convention convened Wednesday. Several departmental group banquets will be held here tonight.

Harry M. Kenin, member of the Portland school board, told the teachers yesterday that school boards in the state have not been making sufficient provision for slow-learning children. "I am speaking," he said, "entirely in behalf of the taxpayers who elect board members and who contribute money for the support of education. It is for their sakes that I believe in the fullest educational program for the care of the mentally defective or slow-learning child. . . . I believe in the fullest education for the slow-learning child who is susceptible to the greatest improvement through education. It will turn out to be real economy."

EGG PRICES HURT BY SECRET CUTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30. — (AP) — The continued shading and secret slashing of Portland egg prices by

outsiders appears responsible for most of the losses in the local trade for recent days. Local co-ops and some of the private firms were trying to uphold values in the interest of the producer but were meeting with intense opposition from those whose chief concern is another territory. Portland is used as a dumping ground.

Receipts of eggs were increasing rapidly from all directions and today were so plentiful that no excuse

remains for the sale of storage goods. However, only a scant supply of the latter was in sight except perhaps in the hands of a few big retail speculators.

The increase in lay was reported heavy in all sections of the Pacific slope.
