Trojans Favored Over Pittsburgh In Rose Bowl Go

S. C. and Western All-Stars Both Hold Weight Advantage Over Eastern Foes In Climaxing Contests.

By Paul Zimmerman Associated Press Sports Writer. PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2.—(AP)—A wreath of roses and a bed of thorns were made ready here today for the football teams of southern California and Pittsburgh.

This was the setting for the eighteenth annual Rose tournament game which many have considered will be a battle for the mythical national championship. Seventy thousand persons were expected to witness the struggle in the picturesque flower bedded Rose bowl nestled between the canyon walls of the Arroyo Seco. Excellent weather conditions were anticipated and the turf on which the contest was to take place had been groomed to the point of perfection.

Troy's ponderous but alert eleven, which went through the regular season without a defeat or a tie, was favored to emerge with the crown of laurels. Southern California will outweigh its eastern opponent more than twelve pounds to the man in the line and approximately ten pounds in the backfield.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Stalwarts of the football world clash here today in the annual East-West charity game for the benefit of crippled children. The contest, sponsored by the Shrine, brings together 1932 heroes of football gridirons in a contest at Kezar stadium.

All-Americans, including Michigan's Harry Newman, Purdue's Paul Morris and Cornell's Joe Martinez-Zorilla, swing into action on the eastern team against a fine-smashing, heavier western squad picked from stars of the Pacific coast.

The western squad outweighs the east on an average of 14 pounds per player. George Sander of Washington State at quarterback, Hank Schaldach of the University of California at left half, Angelo Broccoli of St. Mary's at right half and Max Krause of Gonzaga at fullback are the plugging artists in the west's starting backfield. Bill Morgan, ex-Medford star, now of Oregon is at left tackle for the westerners.

BASKET TOURNAY AGAIN ARRANGED FOR HI SCHOOLS

To Be Host For State Play—Medford Must Meet Portland Champions First.

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Williamette university, Salem, will again be the scene of next year's Oregon state high school basketball championship tournament, and March 18, 17, and 16 were the dates selected here yesterday by the active board of control of the state association gathered in annual business session. The same 16 district alignments as in the past year will prevail.

Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Falls high school, was elected president of the board for the coming year, succeeding Austin Landreth, principal at Pendleton high. Landreth will take Jackson's place as vice president. John L. Gray, principal at West Linn, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Amendments to the constitution of the board were adopted. The invitation to the board to hold the state hoop tournament at Williamette university again was offered by Roy S. (Spec) Keene, director of athletics and coach at the university. Submitting his annual financial report, Secretary Gray stated an account of \$4,003.72 was on hand. The books were audited and given to the audit committee, of which H. H. Johnson of Bend is chairman.

All amendments to the constitution, going before the general assembly, failed to carry except one specifying that a player "carrying three full and regular subjects and doing passing work in them" be eligible for competition. Previously the requirement was carrying four full subjects and passing in three. The amendment was introduced by E. D. Towler, principal at Astoria high school.

109,738 VISITORS AT CRATER LAKE IN PAST SEASON

A total of 109,738 people, traveling in 35,468 cars from every state in the union as well as the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, Asia, Europe, South America, Canal Zone and the Philippine Islands, visited Crater Lake during the travel season of 1932, according to the figures issued by the national park service offices here. This represents a decrease of 60,546 from 1931, travel during that season totalling 170,284. Alaska was represented by eight people in two cars, the District of Columbia by 83 people in 25 cars, Hawaii, 57 people, 17 cars; Canada, 178 people, 63 cars; Asia, four people, two cars; Europe, 11 people, two cars; South America, five people, two cars; Canal Zone, 13 people, 4 cars, and the Philippines, two people in one car. As usual, the largest number of people visiting the park were from the Pacific coast states, led by Oregon, California and Washington. There were 62,423 Oregonians in 20,649 cars, 33,902 Californians in 11,315 cars and 4881 Washingtonians in 1665 cars.
