WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. - (AP) - The domestic allotment farm relief bill designed to establish minimum prices on major agricultural commodities was approved by the house agriculture committee today by a 14 to 8 vote. Action was taken behind closed doors and Chairman Jones declined to make known the individual votes. He said, however, the vote had not been along party lines. In a last minute decision the committee authorized that an amendment be offered when the bill reaches the house floor to add rice to the commodities included, which are wheat, cotton, tobacco and hops.
