National B. P. W. Program Found Of Interest Here

Much interest is being expressed in club circles here in the action taken by the Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs through the five-point program for economic adjustment. The program recommended by Mrs. Gelina MacDonell Bowman of Richmond, Va., president of the National Federation includes: Provision of shelter for homeless, unemployed women; contributions for the relief of the unemployed woman worker; prosperity campaigns to stimulate community buying; extension of opportunities for vocational training to the temporarily unemployed and creation of jobs for women out of work.

In a statement regarding the program, Mrs. Bowman said "because every phase of it has been tried out in some community and found successful."

"One point in our 1933 program is a repetition of a plan for creating 60,000 hours of work a week for unemployed women, which we carried out successfully last year. We asked each of our 60,000 members to offer unemployed woman at least one hour of work a week by retaining her to perform some simple, personal service such as sewing, mending or preparing her dinner at night. The central relief committee was appealed to, to recommend women for these tasks. By appointing special committees to list requests for service, we reduced to a minimum the assigned time and effort in getting from place to place.

"Each club was requested to accept a quota of hours per week equivalent to its membership. The Sioux Falls, S. D., club, with 74 members, provided 1200 hours of work per week, or exactly 17 times the assigned quota, for a several-weeks period. It is one of many clubs making a similarly brilliant record."
