RAYON FEATURED IN M-M WINDOW

The M. M. Department store featuring an unusual window display showing how fine rayon is made, is attracting considerable attention. The material was furnished by the Munsingwear and DuPont companies.

On one side spruce chips and cotton are shown. Fragrant spruce wood and cotton linters are mixed and refined to a pulp. Then there are two jars of pulp. Sheets of pure pulp are received at the rayon plant, ground to a fine crumb and dissolved in liquid form for spinning. It comes out in delicate filaments that are twisted together to form a single thread.

In the center of the display there is a spinner greatly enlarged. The actual spinner is about the size of a small thimble.

The right hand side shows the finished yarn which reaches its loveliness only after washing, bleaching, drying and rigid inspection.
