Gilbert and Sullivan Opera of Interest Here.

Much interest is being expressed here this week in the Medford high school plans for presentation of the Gilbert and Sullivan light opera "Pinafore," by the boys' and girls' glee clubs of the senior high school February 23.

For all who know the Gilbert and Sullivan operas greet with much enthusiasm announcement of their presentation and the work of the high school Glee clubs has also reached a standard, which makes their performance something to anticipate.

The history of the two composers, Gilbert and Sullivan, is an interesting one. Arthur Sullivan, popularly acclaimed throughout his life, was knighted by Queen Victoria, but Gilbert because of his clever satire on British customs, government and royalty remained in spite of his great success and popularity, unknighthood until after the death of Queen Victoria. It is said he was refused admittance to the Royal Yachting club after the production of "Pinafore," which satirizes the British navy.

Sullivan was the one really popular English composer of any artistic standing in his time. In giving credit to Gilbert's witty librettos, he showed once and for all what light opera may be when treated by the hand of a master.

Other operas by Gilbert and Sullivan, dear to the hearts of most music lovers, are: "Mikado," "Pirates of Penzance," which was produced some time ago by the high school singers; "Trial by Jury," "Ruddigore" and "The Gondoliers."
