

TREND OF TIMES LEADS TO HOME AND GOOD COOK

The modern trend is back to the home for games, conversation and good cooking.

With this belief firmly in mind, Helen Brown and Marion Spencer, home economists of the Safeway Stores Homemakers' bureau are preparing for the modernized "kitchening" school.

"Wholesome, economical foods and inexpensive but luscious desserts will be stressed this year," says Mrs. Spencer, "for these will be in accord with present times. In other words, old-fashioned ideas will be new ideas—enhanced by modern efficiency."

The cooking school, under the direct supervision of Julia Lee Wright, national director of the Safeway Stores Homemakers' bureau will bring to the women of Medford the results of expert, year-around food research and recipe experimentation at the bureau testing kitchen each day from 2 until 4 p. m.

There, in that modernized laboratory of "kitchening," old recipes are revamped, new dishes devised, and the bureau's seal of approval placed upon products which meet Mrs. Wright's rigid and uncompromising tests.

Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, national director of the Safeway Stores Homemakers' bureau, who attended the University of Washington, is well known to western women for her radio talks, newspaper articles, authorship of a new cook book, "Recipes You'll Enjoy," and direction of cooking schools.

Miss Helen Brown urges women to wish to qualify as "kitcheners" to come early each day of the class "and bring a pencil and a friend."

"Kitchening," she explained, "is more than mere cooking. It is the art of preparing and serving well balanced and economical meals with a minimum of time and energy."

While not ignoring the "wet" and "dry" question nor the local situation—generally deemed deplorable at this particular time—members of the Jackson County Civic League, in meeting last evening, widened their realm of thought and action to include the Oregon state legislature.

RECREATION CLUB PLAY CONTEST IS GAINING INTEREST

The one-act play contest for rural organizations, which is being sponsored by the Jackson County Recreation club, has created interest throughout the county in amateur play production.

The contest was launched in November with a three-day dramatics institute at which Mrs. Mack was assisted by D. Palmer Young, professor of dramatics, Oregon State college.

Instruction was given on play selection, casting, makeup, lighting and other phases of play production. This institute was attended by 59 leaders representing 15 communities.

The county dramatics committee, composed of the following members of the Recreation club: Mrs. O. C. Maust, chairman, Phoenix; Dr. B. R. Elliott, Medford; Mrs. Victor Bursell, Central Point, announced the following rules:

1. Any rural community group or organization may enter the contest. 2. Only one-act plays may be used. 3. There shall be no professional direction of plays. 4. Competition will be held by districts by February 25, 1933.

5. The district winners will compete for county championship on March 1, 1933. 6. Prize for the best play will be a trip to the Home Interests conference at Oregon State college, when a play will be presented in Little theater.

Organizations that have enrolled to date are as follows: Granges at Lake Creek, Eagle Point, Phoenix, Roky Ann, Applegate, Central Point; home extension units at McLeod, Applegate; Rogue River Civic club and Table Rock Community club.

Playing against a lot of luck and a hard fighting basketball team, the Medford high school Tigers went down to a two-point defeat at the hands of the Roseburg high school in a non-conference game there last night. The game ended with the score 20-18.

Ability of the Roseburg team to play under pressure, and to find the basket with uncanny accuracy, was one of the biggest elements in the Roseburg victory. Although the score was 18-all just three and one-half minutes before the end of the game, two long shots by Collins, Roseburg forward, broke the tie, which Medford was unable to overcome, although the Tigers did find a basket as the whistle blew.

Defensive playing was so close that neither team scored in the third period. Roseburg took the lead in the third period, however, with two long shots, and was never headed.

Too much advance publicity concerning the forwards of each team was largely responsible for the low score, as the checking was unusually close, and all baskets were either hard-earned or lucky.

The Tigers returned to Medford today and found considerable difficulty in traveling through the snow which fell this morning. The team meets Klamath Falls here Friday night in another non-conference game, and fans are looking towards the game as a means of getting some line on Klamath's strength. The Pelican team has been heralded as the most dangerous team in southern Oregon, but Roseburg now looms as a contender.

The score stood at 28-all at the regular closing time. The victory was due to the great work of Captain Huntly Gordon, Cougar center, who put his teammates back in the running for the championship.

With 47 seconds of the regular time left, Gordon stepped to the foul line after being fouled by Carl Lenchitsky, and sunk the free throw that tied the score, necessitating the extra period.

Red MacDonald, Orange guard, who replaced Lenchitsky, put the Orange-men ahead when he converted a free throw. With three minutes to go, Cross broke into the clear and sank the shot which gave his team a 32 to 31 lead. Then Captain Gordon cleverly alighted by his guard to drop in the final basket as the gun ended the game.
