Senator Couzens (R., Mich.) charged in the senate yesterday that lame duck Republicans were "conspiring" to aid the filibuster.

Senators Capper of Kansas, Dale of Vermont, Davis of Pennsylvania, Hatfield of West Virginia, Keen of New Jersey, Oddie of Nevada, and Robinson of Indiana, were also among the "regular" Republicans who voted against the cloture.
