

Tigers in Trim for Clash With Pelicans Here Tonight

GAME WILL TELL LOCALS' CHANCES OF CHAMPIONSHIP

Injury to Scheel's Knee Only Drawback — Visitors Are Doped Among Big Shots of Southern Oregon

With the exception of "Red" Scheel, one of the star guards of the Medford Tiger basketball squad, the Tigers will be in perfect condition for their battle with the Klamath Falls Pelicans on the senior high school floor tonight at 8:00 o'clock. Scheel hurt his knee in the game with Roseburg but will start the game tonight, according to Coach Durwin K. Burgher. Tonight's game will give strong evidence as to how the Medford Tigers will stand the fire at the state tournament, in case they get there, as the Klamath team is rated as one of the strongest contenders in the state.

Pelicans Impress.

The Pelicans have defeated the Bend high school twice this year, and Bend was doped to be one of the big shots in the state league. In winning twice from Bend in non-conference games, Klamath Falls is given practical assurance of going to the state tournament, as Bend is their only formidable contender.

YOUNG CUE STAR MAY GRAB LEAD

CHICAGO, Jan. 20. — (AP) — J. N. Bozeman, Jr., of Vallejo, Cal., red-headed and the youngest player in the tournament, will have an opportunity tonight to grab sole possession of the lead in the battle for the world three-cushion billiards championship.

Bozeman will meet Allen Hall of Chicago, who was defeated in his only start. At the rate Bozeman has been going, he was favored to break the three-way tie for the lead, in which Clarence Jackson of Detroit and Walter Cochran, the ballline wizard from Hollywood, Cal., had a share with two victories and no defeats.

Bozeman and Cochran used their best of yesterday to share the lead with Jackson. Bozeman led almost all the way to defeat Otto Hetsell of Philadelphia, last year's runner-up, 80 to 44, in 45 innings. Cochran played brilliantly to defeat Arthur Thurnblad of Chicago, champion in 1930, 59 to 43, in 39 innings. Hetsell and Cochran had high runs of eight. Thurnblad racked up a 10, and Bozeman got a seven.

BABE'S SALARY ARGUMENT TAKES SPORTS SPOTLIGHT

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. — (AP) — Under the impetus of Babe Ruth's much publicized salary argument with the New York Yankees, baseball, through its hold-out parade, has just about swept all other athletics off the sports pages.

Protests from high-class performers against the size of the pay cuts they've been asked to take have been mounting rapidly and apparently major league magnates will have to use every argument in their repertoire to swing their recalcitrant stars into line before the spring training season.

It's not the principle of the thing, the athletes say, but the amount of cash involved.

The world champion Yankees, of course, have been most prominently mentioned in the holdout news. Ruth, asked to accept \$50,000 for 1933 instead of the \$75,000 he was paid last season, said yesterday he was prepared to accept a cut of 10 or, at the most, 15 per cent.

The guess of the baseball correspondents was that the Babe and Col. Jacob Ruppert eventually would split the difference between \$75,000 and \$50,000 on a contract calling for a salary of \$62,500 for 1933.

Lou Gehrig, who was paid \$27,500 for doing his chores as first base for the Yankees last year, also has balked at the size of the cut the Yankees have asked him to accept, but expects to settle his differences with the club this week.

HUNK SIGNS FOR ANOTHER SEASON

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Jan. 20. — (AP) — Heartley (Hunk) Anderson has signed another one-year contract to prepare the fighting Irish of Notre Dame for their football warfare, quieting reports that there would be a change at South Bend next fall.

Anderson, who succeeded the late Knute Rockne, after the latter's tragic death in 1931, signed up after a conference yesterday with the Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, president of the university, but no action was taken on the status of Athletic Director Jesse Harper, whose contract does not expire until next May.

Last year's staff of assistants, John (Ike) Voelisch, Tommy Yarr, Nordy Hoffman and Marchmont Schwartz, also will have to wait until later for action on contracts.
