## Noted Pianist to Play In Concert Here Feb. 1

One of the newest and most sensational idols of the music world, Jose Echanis, the handsome Cuban pianist, is to play a concert at the high school auditorium here Wednesday evening, February 1, at 8:15 o'clock, under auspices of the Civic Music association.

Echanis began his career almost before he had graduated from short trousers. At first he was accompanist for various celebrated artists; but before long, his brilliant playing was drawing too much attention to himself to suit the renowned tenors with whom he appeared. Newspaper critics sometimes chose to give Echanis the headlines instead of giving them to the singer. As a result, Echanis was practically obliged to abandon his work as accompanist and to embark as a soloist in his own right. His debut as a soloist was made before he was twenty, and the success that he gained on this occasion was substantiated by the triumph which he won in city after city in which he appeared.

Echanis was something of a novelty among pianists. He affected no eccentricities. Instead of flaunting a foreign accent, he endeavored to perfect his English. He was young, idealistic, poetic, but nevertheless a regular fellow, and the handsomest man that had played a piano on the concert stage within many a season. He created what amounted to a furor when he made his first appearance in New York.

But Echanis did not depend upon his personal charm. Apparently he was unaware that he possessed such a thing. He devoted himself to his piano and his music as a monk devotes himself to his prayers. He sought for every idea and emotion confined within the figures of his music; and each year his critics and audiences have found new beauties in his performances.

During the present music season Echanis' concert tour will take him from coast to coast, from New York, where he plays two recitals, to California.

All members of the association are urged to be in their seats at 8:15 o'clock and a special request for quiet throughout the program has been voiced in many music circles.
