LOSS OF LIQUOR DEEP PUZZLE TO FORMER SHERIFF

Foreman Grieve and other members of the grand jury told the court that the disappearance was quite baffling, and the more they probed "the deeper we get in." They held little hope of ever finding a solution. The court ordered the grand jury to revise their first report, so as to make it "more clear and definite," and to specify from which vault in the courthouse the booze was missing. Three people—then Sheriff Jennings, Deputy Paul Jennings and Jailer O. W. (Ike) Dunford had access to the vault and knew the combination.

The grand jury reported 20 gallons of water, in containers supposed to contain alcohol, and were unable to tell how the "switch" had been made. They also reported that Jailer Dunford had 10 gallons of alcohol stored in the jail, and destroyed it without an order of the court. The grand jury foreman thought this was done because he did not know the rules, and was not dishonest. The former sheriff declared he welcomed the fullest investigation. The grand jury closed investigation with the recommendation that a system be evolved for a closer tab on the receipts and destruction of seized liquor in the future.

SISKIYOU SHERIFF TO ARREST KNIFE WIELDER IN HILLS

Siskiyou county, Calif., authorities are expected to take legal action today to bring into custody, W. L. Harlow, 62, mountaineer resident of the Joe Bar district, just over the state line in California, who last Friday afternoon in a frenzy of rage slashed his son, W. L. Harlow of Jacksonville, and the latter's wife, with a knife, when they came to visit him and his wife.

The attack occurred three miles in California, and therefore local authorities have no jurisdiction in the case. Pending the arrival of Siskiyou county officers on the scene, the forest ranger, stationed at Joe Bar, is handling the situation. A report today to the state police said the elder Harlow was calm.

Joe Bar is 40 miles from this city, in a southwesterly direction, and most of the way is over rough mountain roads.
