DEEP DRIFTS ON NEVADA HIGHWAY HOLD 45 IN COLD

Efforts of Two Snow Plows Fail to Liberate Solons and Aides — New Storm Moving South Is Warning

RENO, Nev., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Thirty members and 15 attaches of the Nevada state legislature were snowbound in the Washoe valley, between Reno and Carson City, the state capital, today as a terrific winter storm piled huge drifts on the highway and blocked traffic in both directions.

Drifts from four to six feet deep trapped the legislators and their attaches, en route to Carson City from Reno, in the valley today and efforts of two snow plows to reach them were unavailing. No immediate fear was felt for their safety, however, and highway officials expected to be able to dig them free when the wind subsided.

Because of the absence of the senators and assemblymen, neither house of the legislature had a quorum and all law making was at a standstill. Motorists who attempted to leave Reno later were turned back at Wheelerville, six miles south of here, by drifts that blocked the roadway there.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Bearing more rain and snow for the far west, a new storm was moving southward and inland today from the Pacific, adding to the precipitation of the week-end disturbance which took three lives and left three other persons to an unknown fate.

Storm warnings were posted from Puget Sound southward to Santa Barbara. The weather bureau announced rain began falling in the northern part of northern California this morning, with prospects that it would envelop the entire coastal section as far south as San Diego by tonight or tomorrow. Snow was predicted for the mountain areas of California, Nevada, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

San Francisco and vicinity received a foretaste of the storm when strong winds churned the bay, impeding water traffic. Passengers of a trans-bay ferry stood on their seats as waves lapped its lower deck.

The States line freighter Everett, Manila bound from Vancouver, reported a blizzard accompanied by a 54-mile gale, 700 miles offshore and the freighter General Sherman bound for Yokohama, reported a similar storm 800 miles off the American coast.

In addition to the three known dead, hope was virtually abandoned for three other persons missing in the snow-covered mountains. Blankets carried on a bear hunt into the mountains north of Santa Paula, near Los Angeles, by Virgil Johnson, 45, and his son, Elton, 18, were found in a snowdrift by searchers. Jack Blackler, 20-year-old trapper, missing since Wednesday in Calaveras county, was also believed to have perished.

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STATE FUNDS FOR FAIRS WIPED OUT IN ECONOMY MOVE

SALLEM, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Another saving was scored for the people of Oregon by the ways and means committee last night in the sum of \$165,000, when it was voted to wipe out completely appropriations for the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, the Eastern Oregon Livestock show, and 37 county agricultural fairs.

In this the committee followed the recommendation of Governor Julius L. Meier and Budget Director Henry M. Hansen, as made in the biennial budget. But the committee manifested its independence of influence from the executive office in some other subjects considered, particularly when it restored \$6000 for maintenance of the district school at the W. G. T. U. farm home near Corvallis, which the governor's budget had disappeared.

In the three fair items the Pacific International had requested \$60,000 for premium payments, and the county agricultural fairs \$105,000 by a 1-20 mill millage tax that has been levied for some years in the budget recommendation adopted by the committee, was that this be eliminated. The Eastern Oregon Livestock show, which received \$10,000 two years ago for 1933-34, but the budget anticipated that a request would be made direct to the ways and means committee. The governor's budget had also disappeared a \$75,000 premium request from the Oregon state fair, and recommended that it be put on a self-sustaining basis. This was not covered in last night's action, but hints were not lacking that it would meet the same fate as the other fairs.

DUNNE WOULD KILL WOLFE CREEK ROUTE

SALLEM, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Removal of the Wolfe Creek short route to the sea project from the state highway map will be demanded in a senate resolution to be introduced by Senator Joe E. Dunne of Portland. Senator Dunne contends that the route approved by the highway commission is illogical in that it parallels an existing highway, would necessitate the acquiring of 34 miles of right of way, and would open up no new territory, while the Scappoose-Vernonia route would open up new territory.

HOSPITAL ROAD BUILT 20 YEARS AGO BY PATTON

"Twenty years ago today the town was slusher than it is today, and just as poor," Orsney Patton, Medford's favorite son of old Ireland, declared this morning as he leaned on his broom when a stream of water poured through the snow, sewer bent, on North Central. "There was more water and less drainage," Orsney continued, "and that's when they couldn't get up hospital hill with autos, horses and buggies or horses. And I'm the guy who built the road to let folks through."

"I didn't put Rocky Ann up there," he added with a wide smile, which spread his mustache. "I'm not claiming that, but I did build that road, 20 years ago, and it's there yet. People couldn't get up there to see their sick folks for the water and mud, and I says, 'We got to have a road.' I was street commissioner then, and they said, 'We haven't any money.' And I said, 'We'll have a road anyway,' and we had it."

"They allowed me \$100 to get it done, and we put it in for less than that." The little Irishman dipped his broom deeper into the snow to clear the drain near the Groceria lot of which he is now manager. "We used the stoneless Bulls three away when he built the railroad. We drove them into the ruts and covered them over. Didn't take much topping with that well-drained foundation. And you still got a road there," and with that triumphant remark, Orsney moved down the street with his broom.

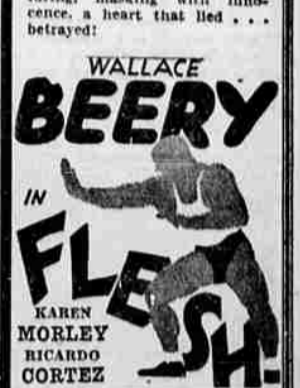
