Only if a state made the required curtailment of production would it be eligible to receive the allotment money for distribution among its producers.

The plan as it passed the house January 12 provides for a tax on the miller, packer or other processor of wheat, cotton, tobacco, hogs, rice, peanuts and dairy products, the money to be paid to farmers who cut production 20 per cent. These allotments would be an amount sufficient to give the farmer the pre-war price on that share of his produce which goes into domestic consumption.

One of the main criticisms of the plan has been, Ronald noted, that it would involve great expense because of the large force that would be needed to check up on a acreage reductions.
