The Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland defeated the Oregon Normal of Monmouth 35 to 28 last night. It was the second straight defeat for the Northerners.

The contest was rough throughout, and 34 personal fouls were called. Ashby and Tipton of the visitors and Howell of the SO Normal were banished on four personal fouls each.

Willie Jones, forward of the SO Normal was high point man. The score at the end of the first half was 14 to 9 in favor of the SO Normal.

Blasting through a fierce checking Monmouth defense for 46 precious points, Willie Jones led Howard Hobson's Southern Oregon Normal basketball quintet to a sensational 40-31 victory over Larry Wolfe's Monmouth Normal team in the first of a two-game series at Ashland Friday night.
