

# Chemawa Indian Cagers to Invade Tigers Lair Friday, Saturday

## HIGHLY TOUTED QUINT TO PLAY DOUBLE HEADER

### Indian Boys Boast But One Defeat for Season—Good Preliminary Games Arranged for Both Evenings

Chemawa's Indian warriors will arrive in Medford on the evening train tomorrow to do battle with the Medford Tiger basketball team Friday and Saturday nights in what will be the best basketball series seen here this year. Chemawa comes to Medford with an enviable record of only one defeat, and of victories over several Portland high schools. No one has the bravery to make any predictions as to the outcome.

Brown of the Tigers has been laid up with the flu, but it back in school today and may see action tomorrow night or in the Saturday game at least, but may not play the full game, Coach Burgher said. Brown is a regular guard, and Luman and Hammock have been fighting it out for the forward berth. If Brown is unable to play White may take his place.

Reliminaries arranged for the games with Chemawa tomorrow night and Saturday are between the South Methodist and Tiger Cubs on Friday and Elsie high school and the Cubs on Saturday.

Chemawa comes to Medford with a team of husky, ducky toppers, and all Medford sports fans who want to see a group of genuine Indians on the warpath will have the chance of a lifetime. The Indians are tricky and specialize in tricky and unexpected plays.

Medford's starting lineup, according to Coach Burgher, will likely be Hammock and Luman forwards; Harris, center, and Scheel and T. White, guards. Brown, Kunneman and others may see action before the evening is over, however.

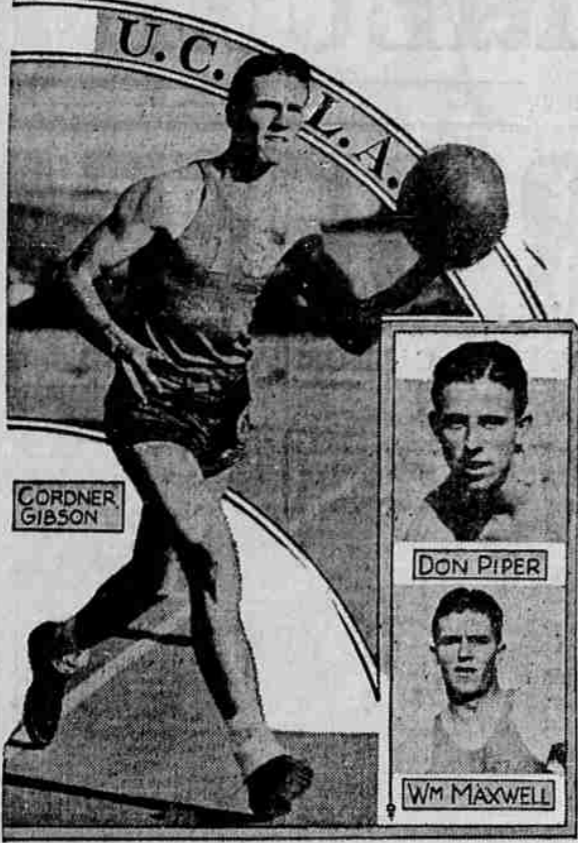

### Oilers Stage Stubborn Rally in Second Half, But Fail to Overcome Sons' Lead—Individuals Brilliant

Southern Oregon Normal took a hard earned victory of 36 to 21 from the Texaco quintet last night on the senior high school floor. Texaco, after a slow start came back after the half to carry the game to the invaders. The Sons took an early lead, which the independents were never able to overcome.

While the Sons did not play as smoothly as in most of the trays in which they have taken part, they did work on their plays until they had amassed a big lead which carried them through the Texaco's brilliant last half rally.

The game was rough and there were many spills. Few fouls were called. Willie Jones, Southern Oregon Normal's big forward, was high point man with 13 markers to his credit. Bud Jones, guard for the Sons, took second honors with 8 points, all of which he scored in the first half. He was

the only player on the floor who could find the hoop consistently. George Harrington, Texaco guard, lead his team, scoring 8 points, while Archie Laing, the local center, accounted for 5. The same hard luck which dogged the Sons, kept Harrington, Laing and Hughes from making crumple shots from under the basket.

Laing played consistent ball and was the outstanding man when it came to faking and pivoting. His floor game was a treat for the fans who enjoy the finer qualities of the game.

The outstanding work for the Sons came from the late Jones boys, who played, heady, consistent ball. Jockisch, guard for the Sons, played a great defensive game, but failed to come up to his standard on offense. Ward Howell, Southern Oregon Normal's pivot man, was continually "booped" because of his rough playing and floor tactics.

The Jacksonville townies scored at will on the invading Butte Falls basketekers. From the opening gun there was never a doubt who would win. The score was 48 to 27.
